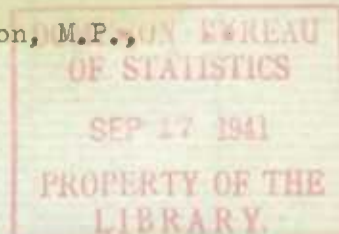

CREAMERY BUTTER

The total of the Summary of Creamery Butter in Canada at the opening of business on Sept. 1, 1941 was 62,708,139 lb. of which 61,896,139 lb. was Canadian make in storage and 812,000 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies. In addition there were potential stocks of 401,638 lb. held "In Bond". Of the Canadian butter in storage 43,366,119 lb. were held in cold storage warehouses and 18,530,020 lb. or 29.9 per cent in dairy factories. In these figures, however, there was included an estimate of 1,425,000 lb. for firms failing to report on time.

The Grand Total storage stocks of Canadian make were 61.9 million lb. or 6.9 per cent more than last year. The net "Into-storage" movement for the month of August was 11.1 million lb. (being 31.4 per cent of the preliminary figures for August production) as compared with a similar movement of 8.0 million lb. for August 1940.

DAIRY BUTTER

The stocks of this commodity as reported at September 1, 1941 amounted to 314,584 lb. which was a decrease of 213,224 lb. from last year.

CHEESE

Warehouses and dairy factories reported 40,466,205 lb. of cheese. Adding 1,862,000 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 42,328,205 lb. is shown.

These figures represent an increase of 9.3 million lb. or 23.1 per cent over last year, and a net "Into-Storage" movement of 10.0 million lb. as compared with an opposite movement of 210 thousand lb. for August 1940. The net "Into-Storage" movement for August 1941 was equivalent to 42.4 per cent of the preliminary figures of production for the same month.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk amounted to 25,560,280 lb. which is a decrease of 3.6 million lb. from last year. The apparent net "Into-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for August was 4.8 million lb.

The chief by-product, Skim Milk Powder, amounted to 2,320,765 lb., a decrease of 1.6 million lb. from last year and a decrease of 703 thousand lb. from last month.

The above figures include estimates for outstanding firms.

EGGS

Cold Storage Eggs came to a total of 11,084,523 dozens.

Fresh Eggs totalled 1,085,194 dozens.

Total Shell Eggs showed a net "Into-Storage" movement of 506 thousand dozens, as compared with an "Out-of-Storage" movement of 515 thousand dozens for August 1940.

Shell eggs in transit at Sept. 1, 1941 amounted to 191,490 dozens.

Frozen eggs totalled 6,610,313 lb. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement was 95 thousand lb. as compared with a similar movement of 391 thousand lb. during August 1940.

DRESSED POULTRY

Total stocks of all poultry reported at Sept. 1, 1941 were 2,670,172 lb. Chickens in stock amounted to 700,176 lb; fowl to 343,626 lb; and turkeys to 1,121,474 lb.

The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of all dressed poultry was 603 thousand lb. as compared with 897 thousand lb. in August 1940.
