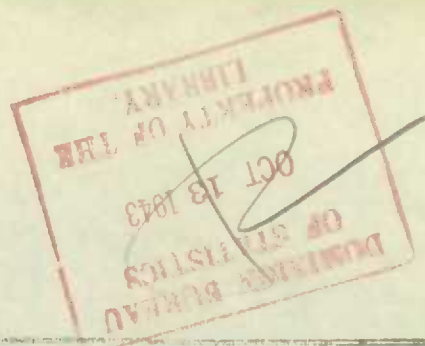

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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS, OCTOBER 1, 1943

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on October 1, 1943 the Summary of Creamery Butter in Canada amounted to 78,901,142 lb. made up of Canadian make in Storage 76,089,942 lb. and 2,811,200 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies. Included in these figures were 2,088,000 lb. as an estimate for farms that did not report on time. Potential stocks of butter "In Bond", not included in these figures, were reported as 684,670 lb.

Cold storage warehouses had in store 55,357,397 lb. of the holdings of Canadian made butter, while dairy factories held the remaining 20,732,545 lb. or 27.2 per cent.

Commenting upon the report, officials of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board observed that little change had occurred in the reserve stocks position during the past month. They pointed out that production of creamery butter in September was but 4 per cent higher than in September 1942, whereas the cumulative increase for the first eight months of this year had been 15 per cent. Furthermore, new producer subsidies on fluid milk and milk for concentrated milk products and cheese, which became effective October 1, are expected to divert some fat from butter making and, with Canada now entering the season of low production, storage reserves will have to be heavily drawn upon to meet the civilian ration and requirements of the Armed Forces, Red Cross Prisoner-of-War parcels, ship stores and Newfoundland and the British West Indies between this time and next spring. It was stated that disappearance of creamery butter in September was at a high level and slightly in excess of last year. This was due principally to the continued heavy demand which exists even with rationing and to the export of some butter to the United Kingdom as part of the 7 million pounds which Canada is providing to that country to help maintain the two ounce weekly ration there. In this connection officials state that less than half the quantity arranged for had been shipped in September. The balance is expected to go forward in the current month.

DAIRY BUTTER

The stocks of this commodity as reported at October 1, 1943 amounted to 377,503 lb. which was an increase of 131,860 lb. over last year. Stocks for the Commodity Prices Stabilization Corporation Limited are included as reported by firms.

CHEESE

With a total of 56,513,784 lb. (including an estimate of 1,564,000 lb.) held by warehouses and dairy factories, cheese stocks showed a decrease of 16.1 million lb., or 22.1 per cent from the stocks for the same date a year ago. The net "Into-Storage" movement for September 1943 was 7.4 million lb. (being 31.6 per cent of the preliminary September production) as compared with a like movement of 858 thousand lb. a year ago.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 12,867,320 lb. which was a decrease of 2.0 million lb. from last year. The apparent net "Out-of-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for September was 370,289 lb. The chief by-product, Skim-Milk Powder, amounted to 2,996,108 lb. a decrease of 172,293 lb. from last year and a decrease of 324,618 lb. from last month. Casain in the hands of users is given in a footnote to page 4.

EGGS

Cold Storage Eggs came to a total of 428,238 dozens. Fresh Eggs totalled 2,171,923 dozens. Total Shell Eggs were 67.4 per cent less than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 1.0 million dozens, as compared with a like movement of 4.6 million dozens for September 1942. Shell Eggs in transit at October 1, 1943 amounted to 265,140 dozens.

Frozen Eggs totalled 16,717,562 lb. being only 0.7 per cent more than the 1943 figures. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement for September 1943 was 2.5 million lb. as compared with 1.0 million lb. during September 1942.

DRESSED POULTRY

On October 1 total poultry stocks reported and estimated were 4,018,348 lb., being a decrease of 610,745 lb. from last year's figures. Chickens in stock amounted to 1,158,675 lb.; fowl to 1,619,636 lb.; and turkeys to 280,639 lb., not including estimates. An "Into-Storage" movement of 1.5 million lb. is shown for September 1943 while an "Out-of-Storage" movement of 1.3 million lb. was shown for the same month last year.
