



STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS, AUGUST 1, 1943

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on August 1, 1943 the Summary of Creamery Butter in Canada amounted to 62,522,613 1b, made up of Canadian make in Storage 61,318,613 lb, and 1,204,000 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies. Included in these figures were 2,014,000 lb. as an estimate for firms that did not report on time, When compared with the five-year average the August 1 Summary shows an increase of 13.9 million 1b, Potential stocks of butter "In Bond", not included in these figures, were reported as 1,058,657 lb

Cold storage warehouses had in store 42,722,219 lb. of the holdings of Canadian made butter, while dairy factories held the rama ning 18,596,394 lb. or 30,3 per cent.

Commenting on the butter situation, as revealed by the statistics released for July, officials of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board have pointed out that butter production has now passed the year's peak and is on the normal seasonal trend downward as indicated by the July production figure which is a 4 per cent reduction from the June figure,

Respecting stocks in store Board officials said that the figures as of August 1 show a gratifying improvement over the situation at this time last year, which was critical, leading eventually to rationing at a level lower than now prevails. However, though stocks in store now are substantially larger than at this date last year, when the figures are reduced to a per capita basis, they represent a total of less than 5 1/2 pounds per person, as compared to the present ration rate of 26 pounds per person per year=in other words, a supply sufficient for only eleven weeks. Board officials further point out that the figures for butter disappearance in July show that the present rate of disappearance or consumption, even with rationing, is still some two million pounds per month greater than in normal times.

DAIRY BUTTER

The stocks of this commodity as reported at August 1, 1943 amounted to 257, 169 lb, which was a decrease of 69,918 lb.

CHEESE

With a total of 51,084,365 lb. (including an estimate of

cheese stocks showed a degree of 16.6 million 1b., or 24.6 per cent, from the stocks for the same date a year ago. The net "Into-Storage" movement for July 1943 was 7.6 million 1b. (being 28.5 per cent of the preliminary July production figures) as compared with a like movement of 4.7 million 1b. a year ago.

Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk held by or for manufacturers CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS amounted to 12,784,943 lb. which was a decrease of 7,946,951 lb. from last year. The apparent net "Into-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for July was 1,614,589 lb. The chief by-product. Skim-Milk Powder, amounted to 3,495,456 lb. an increase of only 4,989 lb. over last year and an increase of 517,151 lb. over last month. Casein in the hands of users is given in a footnote to page 4.

Cold Storage Eggs same to a total of 861,934 dozens. EGGS Fresh Eggs totalled 3,538,699 dozens. Total Shell Eggs were 71.8 per cent less than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Out-cf-Storage" movement of 1 million dozens, as compared with a like movement of 2 million dozens for July 1942

Shell eggs in transit at August 1, 1943 amounted to 250,410 dozens. Frozen eggs totalled 18,060,905 lb, being 12.8 per cent more than the 1942 figures. The net "Into-Storage" movement for July 1943 was 923 thousand lb. as compared with 2.9 million lb, during July 1942.

On August 1 total poultry stocks reported and estimated DRESSED POULTRY were 1,876,647 lb. being a decrease of 5 million lb. from last year's figures. Chickens in stock amounted to 387,124 lb.; fowl to 381,279 lb.; and turkeys to 520,895 lb., not including estimates. An "Into-Storage" movement of 75 thousand lb. is shown for July 1943 while an "Out-of-Storage" movement of 750 thousand lb. was shown for the same month last year.
