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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - JANUARY 1, 1949

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on January 1, 1949 the stocks of creamery butter in Canada amounted to 37,129,000 lb. made up of Canadian make in storage 31,848,000 lb., 5,001,000 lb. Imported and 280,000 lb. in transit. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 18,466,000 lb. while dairy factories held the remaining 13,382,000 lb. or 42.0 per cent. The summary total was lower than last year by 6.7 million lb. and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 9.6 million lb. The five year average was 42,284,000 lb.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 34,566,000 lb. consisting of 34,322,000 lb. Canadian 16,000 lb. Imported and 228,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 3.8 million lb. and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 3.0 million lb.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 16,267,000 lb. which was an increase of 11.1 million lb. over last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for December 1948 was 1.9 million lb. The chief by-product skimmilk powder, amounted to 7,943,000 lb. an increase of 2.9 million lb. over last year and an increase of 499 thousand pounds over last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,695,000 lb. on January 1, 1949 and 2,313,000 lb. on December 1, 1948.

EGGS

There were no cold storage eggs reported on January 1, 1949. Fresh Eggs totalled 65,000 cases. Shell Eggs in transit at January 1, 1949 amounted to 29,000 cases. Frozen Eggs totalled 7,280,000 lb. being 3.9 million lb. lower than the 1948 figures. The net "out-of-storage" movement for December 1948 was 1.2 million lb. as compared with a like movement of 2.0 million pounds during December 1947.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on January 1, 1949 was lower than last year by 18.1 million lb. An "into-storage" movement of 342 thousand lb. is shown for the month of December 1948. Chickens in stock amounted to 5,864,000 lb. fowl to 6,817,000 lb. and turkeys to 3,616,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 50,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on January 1, 1949.
