STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - SEPTEMBER 1, 1949

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on September 1, 1949 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 66,540,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 52,139,000 lb. while dairy factories held 13,692,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 382,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 15.5 million pounds. The five year average of September 1 stocks is 63,766,000 lb. The August 1949 "into-storage" movement was 9.8 million pounds as compared with a like movement of 6.0 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 28,703,000 lb. consisting of 23,508,000 lb. Canadian 119,000 lb. imported and 76,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 27.0 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 973,000 pounds.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 57,082,000 lb. which was an increase of 3.2 million pounds over last year. The apparent net "into-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for August 1949 was 1.9 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 13,063,000 lb. an increase of 3.9 million pounds over last year and an increase of 901,000 lb. over last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 931,000 lb. on September 1, 1949.

EGGS

On September 1, 1949 there were 519,000 cases of cold storage eggs reported 42,000 cases of fresh eggs and 15,000 cases of shell eggs in transit, frozen eggs totalled 5,783,000 lb. being 5.0 million pounds lower than the 1948 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for August 1949 was 847,000 lb. as compared with a similar movement of 884,000 lb. during August 1948.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on September 1, 1949 was lower than last year by 702,000 lb. An "into-storage" movement of 1.0 million pounds is shown for the month of August 1949. Chickens in stock amounted to 2,284,000 lb. fowl to 2,884,000 lb. and turkeys to 1,222,000 lb. not including estimates. There were no stocks of dressed poultry in transit on September 1, 1949.
