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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - JANUARY 1, 1950

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on January 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 57,022,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 43,842,000 lb. while dairy factories held 12,690,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 490,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 19.7 million pounds. The five year average of January 1 stocks is 40,474,000 lb. The December 1949 "out-of-storage" movement was 9.3 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 9.3 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 43,950,000 lb. consisting of 43,578,000 lb. Canadian 120,000 lb. Imported and 152,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 9.3 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 3.4 million pounds.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 35,322,000 lb. which was an increase of 19.0 million pounds over last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated Whole milk for December 1949 was 6.5 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 5,534,000 lb., a decrease of 2.4 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 1.9 million pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 2,034,000 lb. on January 1, 1950.

EGGS

On January 1, 1950 there were 24,000 cases of cold storage eggs reported, 58,000 cases of fresh eggs and 11,000 cases of shell eggs in transit frozen eggs totalled 2,538,000 lb. being 4.8 million pounds lower than the 1949 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for December 1949 was 667 thousand pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.2 million pounds during December 1948.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on January 1, 1950 was higher than last year by 9,197,000 lb. An "into-storage" movement of 4.4 million pounds is shown for the month of December 1949. Chickens in stock amounted to 10,322,000 lb. fowl to 8,431,000 lb. and turkeys to 4,811,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 100,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on January 1, 1950.


