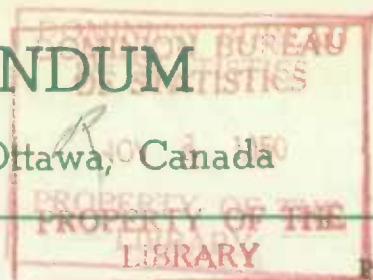

## STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - NOVEMBER 1, 1950

### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on November 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 64,781,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 48,939,000 lb. while dairy factories held 15,352,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 490,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 10.5 million pounds. The five year average of November 1 stocks is 66,540,000 lb. The October 1950 "out-of-storage" movement was 5.4 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.6 million pounds last year.

### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 29,801,000 lb. consisting of 29,045,000 lb. Canadian 414,000 lb. Imported and 342,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 16.4 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 4.4 million pounds.

### CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 24,420,000 lb. which was a decrease of 29.1 million pounds from last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for October 1950 was 1.7 million pounds. The chief by-product skim milk powder amounted to 5,036,000 lb. a decrease of 18.3 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 1.1 million pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,632,000 lb. on November 1, 1950. Ice Cream stocks amounted to 669,000 gallons as compared with 746,000 gallons on October 1.

### EGGS

On November 1, 1950 there were 55,000 cases of cold storage eggs reported 47,000 cases of fresh eggs and 5,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 8,801,000 lb. being 4.6 million pounds higher than the 1949 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for October 1950 was 1.2 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 910,000 lb. during October 1949.

### DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on November 1, 1950 was lower than last year by 4.6 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 3.0 million pounds is shown for the month of October 1950. Chickens in stock amounted to 3,908,000 lb. fowl to 4,930,000 lb. and turkeys to 1,263,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 225,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on November 1, 1950.
