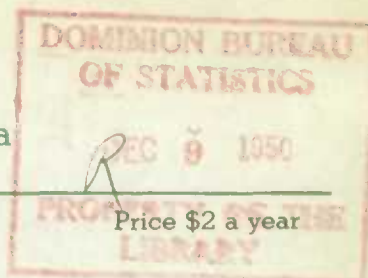

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## STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS -

DECEMBER 1, 1950CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on December 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 52,825,000 lb. Cold Storage Warehouses had in store 40,270,000 lb. while dairy factories held 12,345,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 210,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 13.6 million pounds. The five year average of December 1 stocks is 56,138,000 lb. The November 1950 "out-of-storage" movement was 12.1 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 8.9 million pounds last year.

## STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - DECEMBER 1, 1950

### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on December 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 52,077,000 lb. Cold Storage Warehouses had in store 39,522,000 lb. while dairy factories held 12,345,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 210,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 14.3 million pounds. The five year average of December 1 stocks is 56,138,000 lb. The November 1950 "out-of-storage" movement was 12.9 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 8.9 million pounds last year.

### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 28,565,000 lb. consisting of 26,162,000 lb. Canadian 1,947,000 lb. Imported and 456,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 18.8 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 1.4 million pounds for November 1950.

### CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 21,073,000 lb. which was a decrease of 20.8 million pounds from last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for November 1950 was 3.2 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 3,588,000 lb. a decrease of 6.1 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 1.5 million pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,380,000 lb. on December 1, 1950. Ice Cream stocks amounted to 660,000 gallons as compared with 622,000 gallons on November 1.

### EGGS

On December 1, 1950 there were 8,000 cases of cold storage eggs reported, 34,000 cases of fresh eggs and 5,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 8,124,000 lb. being 4.9 million pounds higher than the 1949 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for November 1950 was 869 thousand pounds as compared with a similar movement of 953,000 lb. during November 1949.

### DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on December 1, 1950 was lower than last year by 5.5 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 4.7 million pounds is shown for the month of November 1950. Chickens in stock amounted to 5,761,000 lb. fowl to 4,418,000 lb. and turkeys to 3,030,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 400,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on December 1, 1950.
