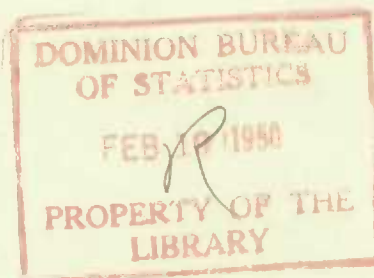

## STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - FEBRUARY 1, 1950

### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on February 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 46,494,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 36,203,000 lb. while dairy factories held 9,976,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 315,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 18.8 million pounds. The five year average of February 1 stocks is 28,922,000 lb. The January 1950 "out-of-storage" movement was 9.6 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 9.6 million pounds last year.

### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 41,127,000 lb. consisting of 40,883,000 lb. Canadian 92,000 lb. Imported and 152,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 9.9 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 3.1 million pounds.

### CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 24,079,000 lb. which was an increase of 10.1 million pounds over last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for January 1950 was 11.2 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 3,985,000 pounds, a decrease of 3.1 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 1.5 million pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,740,000 lb. on February 1, 1950.

### EGGS

On February 1, 1950 there were 20,000 cases of cold storage eggs reported, 58,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit frozen eggs totalled 4,897,000 lb. being 1.7 million pounds lower than the 1949 figure. The net "into-storage" movement for January 1950 was 1.3 million pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 712 thousand pounds during January 1949.

### DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on February 1, 1950 was higher than last year by 10.0 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 1.7 million pounds is shown for the month of January 1950. Chickens in stock amounted to 10,157,000 lb. fowl to 8,277,000 lb. and turkeys to 4,668,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 25,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on February 1, 1950.
