

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - AFRIL 1, 1950

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on April 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canadaamounted to 27,918,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 20,998,000 lb. while dairy factories held 6,080,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 840,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 15.2 million pounds. The five year average of April 1 stocks is 11,077,000 lb. The March 1950 "out-of-storage" movement was 8.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 6.0 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 34,915,000 lb. consisting of 34,578,000 lb. Canadian 71,000 lb. Imported and 266,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 10.2 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 4.2 million pounds.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 6,555,000 lb. which was a decrease of 8.4 million pounds from last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for March 1950 was 6.0 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 2,641,000 lb. a decrease of 5.1 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 223 thousand pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 215,000 lb. on April 1, 1950.

EGGS

On April 1, 1950 there were 161,000 cases of <u>cold storage eggs</u> reported, 68,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of <u>shell eggs in transit</u>. Frozen eggs totalled 5,752,000 lb. being 633 thousand pounds lower than the 1949 figure. The net "into-storage" movement for March 1950 was 522 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 149 thousand pounds during March 1949.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on April 1, 1950 was higher than last year by 9.2 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 4.1 million pounds is shown for the month of March 1950. Chickens in stock amounted to 7,314,000 lb. fowl to 4,272,000 lb. and turkeys to 4,403,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 175,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on April 1, 1950.
