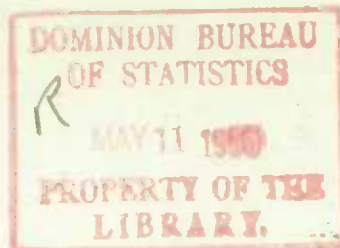

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND DAIRY PRODUCTS - MAY 1, 1950

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on May 1, 1950 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 28,547,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 20,627,000 lb. while dairy factories held 7,375,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 545,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 15.0 million pounds. The five year average of May 1 stocks is 9,913,000 lb. The April 1950 "into-storage" movement was 1.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 796 thousand pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 33,744,000 lb. consisting of 33,371,000 lb. Canadian 69,000 lb. Imported and 304,000 lb. intransit. The summary total was higher than last year by 9.8 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 1.2 million pounds.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 6,868,000 lb. which was a decrease of 12.2 million pounds from last year. The apparent net "into-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for April 1950 was 313 thousand pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 3,529,000 lb. a decrease of 6.4 million pounds from last year and an increase of 962 thousand pounds over last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 51,000 lb. on May 1, 1950.

EGGS

On May 1, 1950 there were 280,000 cases of cold storage eggs reported 86,000 cases of fresh eggs and 8,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 6,337,000 lb. being 30 thousand pounds lower than the 1949 figure. The net "into-storage" movement for April 1950 was 592 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 18 thousand pounds during April 1949.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on May 1, 1950 was higher than last year by 8.2 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 2.9 million pounds is shown for the month of April 1950. Chickens in stock amounted to 5,503,000 lb. fowl to 3,880,000 lb. and turkeys to 3,662,000 lb., not including estimates. There were no dressed poultry stocks in transit on May 1, 1950.
