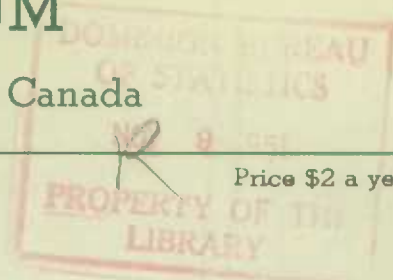

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - NOVEMBER 1, 1951

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on November 1, 1951 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 66,257,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 47,482,000 lb. while dairy factories held 17,637,000 pounds. Butter in transit amounted to 1,138,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 1.3 million pounds. The five year average of November 1 stocks is 66,500,000 lb. The October 1951 "into-storage" movement was 3.6 million pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 5.4 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 41,787,000 lb. consisting of 37,297,000 lb. Canadian, 3,996,000 lb. Imported and 494,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 11.8 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 3.2 million pounds for October 1951.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 52,062,000 lb. which was an increase of 27.8 million pounds over last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for October 1951 was 8.1 million pounds. The chief by-product skim milk powder amounted to 11,507,000 lb. an increase of 6.4 million pounds over last year and an increase of 1.5 million pounds over last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,789,000 lb. on November 1, 1951. Ice Cream stocks amounted to 725,000 gallons as compared with 640,000 gallons on November 1, 1950.

EGGS

The November 1, 1951 report shows 28,000 cases of cold storage eggs 36,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 5,670,000 lb. being 3.3 million pounds lower than the 1950 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for October 1951 was 825 thousand pounds as compared with a similar movement of 972 thousand pounds during October 1950.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on November 1, 1951 was higher than last year by 9.5 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 6.0 million pounds is shown for the month of October 1951. Chickens in stock amounted to 7,593,000 pounds, fowl to 9,859,000 lb. and turkeys 1,180,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 175,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit and imports amounted to 233,000 lb. on November 1, 1951.
