



#### STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - DECEMBER 1, 1951

#### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on December 1, 1951 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 57,774,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 40,584,000 lb. while dairy factories held 16,910,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 280,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 4.9 million pounds. The five year average of December 1 stocks is 56,428,000 lb. The November 1951 "out-of-storage" movement was 8.3 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 12.1 million pounds last year.

#### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 36,785,000 lb. consisting of 32,923,000 lb. Canadian, 3,368,000 lb. imported and 494,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 8.4 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 5.2 million pounds for November 1951.

#### CONCENTRATED MILK FRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 42,475,000 lb. which was an increase of 21.4 million pounds over last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for November 1951 was 9.6 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 9,358,000 lb. an increase of 5.8 million pounds over last year and a decrease of 1.3 million pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,678,000 lb. on December 1, 1951. Ice Cream stocks amounted to 711,000 gallons as compared with 672,000 gallons on December 1, 1950.

#### EGGS

The December 1, 1951 report shows 9,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 37,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 4,350,000 lb. being 3.7 million pounds lower than the 1950 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for November 1951 was 1.3 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 955 thousand pounds during November 1950.

#### DRESSED FOULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on December 1, 1951 was higher than last year by 12.7 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 8.4 million pounds is shown for the month of November 1951. Chickens in stock amounted to 11,787,000 lb. fowl to 10,492,000 lb. and turkeys 3,611,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 400,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit and imports amounted to 236,000 lb. on December 1, 1951.
