

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### STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - FEBRUARY 1, 1951

#### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on February 1, 1951 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 25,751,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 17,695,000 lb. while dairy factories held 7,671,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 385,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 20.6 million pounds. The five year average of February 1 stocks is 32,064,000 lb. The January 1951 "out-of-storage" movement was 13.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 10.7 million pounds last year.

#### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 27,236,000 lb. consisting of 25,550,000 lb. Canadian, 1,534,000 lb. Imported and 152,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 13.9 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 868 thousand pounds for January 1951.

#### CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 9,039,000 lb. which was a decrease of 15.0 million pounds from last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for January 1951 was 7.9 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 2,436,000 lb. a decrease of 1.6 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 421 thousand pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 903,000 lb. on February 1, 1951. Ice Gream stocks amounted to 579,000 gallons as compared with 466,000 gallons on February 1, 1950.

#### EGGS

The February 1, 1951 report shows 48,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 50,000 cases of fresh eggs and 5,000 cases of shell eggs in transit.

Frozen eggs totalled 5,577,000 lb. being 970 thousand pounds higher than the 1950 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for January 1951 was 1.2 million pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 2.1 million pounds during January 1950.

### DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on February 1, 1951 was lower than last year by 7.0 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 1.7 million pounds is shown for the month of January 1951. Chickens in stock amounted to 6,314,000 lb. fowl to 4,652,000 lb. and turkeys to 4,408,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 50,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on February 1, 1951.
