STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - APRIL 1, 1951

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on April 1, 1951 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 9,899,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 4,299,000 lb. while dairy factories held 4,025,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 1,575,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 18.0 million pounds. The five year average of April 1 stocks is 13,943,000 lb. The March 1951 "out-of-storage" movement was 5.2 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 8.6 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 19,911,000 lb. consisting of 18,582,000 lb. Canadian, 873,000 lb. Imported and 456,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 15.1 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 4.4 million pounds for March 1951.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 2,373,000 lb. which was a decrease of 4.2 million pounds from last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for March 1951 was 2.2 million pounds. The chief by-product skim milk powder amounted to 1,787,000 lb. a decrease of 780 thousand pounds from last year and a decrease of only 1 thousand pounds from last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 191,000 lb. on April 1, 1951. Ice Cream stocks amounted to 667,000 gallons as compared with 522,000 gallons on April 1, 1950.

EGGS

The April 1, 1951 report shows 88,000 cases of cold storage eggs 42,000 cases of fresh eggs and 7,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 3,918,000 lb. being 1.8 million pounds lower than the 1950 figure. The net "out-of-storage" movement for March 1951 was 747 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 513,000 lb. during March 1950.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on April 1, 1951 was lower than last year by 5.3 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 2.6 million pounds is shown for the month of March 1951. Chickens in stock amounted to 4,485,000 lb. fowl to 2,207,000 lb. and turkeys 3,796,000 lb. not including estimates. There were 50,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on April 1, 1951, and 26,000 lb. Imported.
