## STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - JUNE 1, 1951

### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on June 1, 1951 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 16,109,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 6,795,000 lb. while dairy factories held 8,754,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 560,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 16.1 million pounds. The five year average of June 1 stocks is 22,064,000 lb. The May 1951 "into-storage" movement was 5.9 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 3.7 million pounds last year.

### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 20,733,000 lb. consisting of 20,114,000 lb. Canadian 353,000 lb. Imported and 266,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 16.5 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 2.7 million pounds for May 1951.

### CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 11,440,000 lb. which was an increase of 788 thousand pounds over last year. The apparent net "into-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for May 1951 was 7.0 million pounds. The chief by-product skimmilk powder amounted to 3,735,000 lb. a decrease of 1.7 million pounds from last year and an increase of 1.4 million pounds over last month. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 179,000 lb. on June 1, 1951. Ice Cream stocks amounted to 882,000 gallons as compared with 789,000 gallons on June 1, 1950.

### EGGS

The June 1, 1951 report shows 190,000 cases of cold storage eggs 67,000 cases of fresh eggs and 5,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 4,986,000 lb. being 3.1 million pounds lower than the 1950 figure. The net "into-storage" movement for May 1951 was 852 thousand pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.8 million pounds during May 1950.

### DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on June 1, 1951 was lower than last year by 4.5 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 2.0 million pounds is shown for the month of May 1951. Chickens in stock amounted to 2,824,000 lb. fowl to 1,304,000 lb. and turkeys 2,435,000 lb. not including estimates. There were no stocks of dressed poultry in transit on June 1, 1951.
