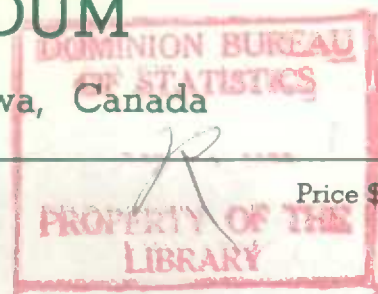

## STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - OCTOBER 1, 1952.

### CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on October 1, 1952 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 77,427,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 59,283,000 lb. while dairy factories held 18,074,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 70,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 14.8 million pounds. The five-year average of October 1 stocks is 67,383,000 lb. The September, 1952 'into-storage' movement was 6.2 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 6.9 million pounds last year.

### CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 51,153,000 lb. consisting of 49,693,000 lb. Canadian, 1,004,000 lb. imported and 456,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 6.1 million pounds and showed an 'into-storage' movement of 4.0 million pounds for September 1952.

### CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 94,091,000 lb. which was an increase of 34.0 million lb. over last year. The 'into-storage' movement of evaporated whole milk for September 1952 was 610 thousand pounds. The chief by-product, skim-milk powder amounted to 18,823,000 lb. an increase of 8.9 million pounds over last year and an increase of 1.3 million pounds over last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 2,907,000 gallons as compared with 795,000 gallons on October 1, 1951. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,238,000 lb. on October 1, 1952 while last year, at the same date, they amounted to 1,860,000 lb.

### EGGS

The October 1, 1952 report shows 99,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 42,000 cases of fresh eggs and 1,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 9,128,000 lb. being 2.6 million pounds higher than the 1951 figure. The 'out-of-storage' movement for September 1952 was 1.1 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 568 thousand pounds during September 1951.

### DRESSED POULTRY

Total poultry stocks on October 1, 1952 were higher than last year by 3.0 million pounds. An 'into-storage' movement of 575 thousand pounds is shown for the month of September 1952. Chickens in stock amounted to 4,331,000 lb., fowl to 5,120,000 lb. and turkeys to 1,487,000 lb. There were 125,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on October 1, 1952 and there were no imported stocks reported.
