

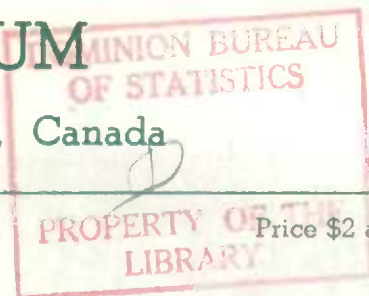

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS

SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on December 1, 1952 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 66,392,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 51,338,000 lb. while dairy factories held 14,984,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 70,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 9.8 million pounds. The five year average of December 1 stocks is 56,371,000 lb. The November 1952 "out-of-storage" movement was 7.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 9.5 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 43,256,000 lb. consisting of 42,713,000 lb. Canadian, 315,000 lb. imported and 228,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 6.3 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 3.0 million pounds for November 1952.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 64,051,000 lb. which was an increase of 21.6 million pounds over last year. The "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for November 1952 was 18.8 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 17,051,000 lb. an increase of 7.8 million pounds over last year and a decrease of 1.6 million pounds over last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 680,000 gallons as compared with 729,000 gallons on December 1, 1951. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,115,000 lb. on December 1, 1952.

EGGS

The December 1, 1952 report shows 6,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 32,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 6,295,000 lb. being 1.9 million pounds higher than the 1951 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for November 1952 was 1.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.3 million pounds during November 1951.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on December 1, 1952 was lower than last year by 8.4 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 6.4 million pounds is shown for the month of November 1952. Chickens in stock amounted to 6,637,000 lb., fowl to 6,137,000 lb. and turkeys 5,950,000 lb., not including estimates. There were 450,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on December 1, 1952.
