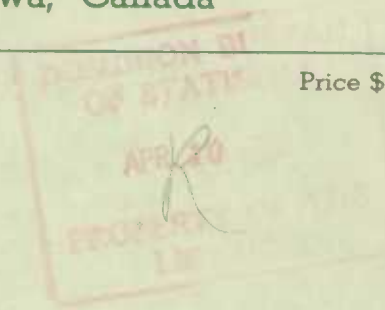

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - APRIL 1, 1952

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on April 1, 1952 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 17,397,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 11,977,000 lb. while dairy factories held 5,140,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 290,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 7.6 million pounds. The five year average of April 1 stocks is 14,831,000 lb. The March 1952 "out-of-storage" movement was 8.2 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 7.5 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 26,927,000 lb., consisting of 24,596,000 lb. Canadian, 1,799,000 lb. imported and 532,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 6.9 million pounds and showed a net "out-of-storage" movement of 2.8 million pounds for March 1952.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 12,953,000 lb. which was an increase of 10.6 million pounds over last year. The apparent net "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for March 1952 was 3.0 million pounds. The chief by-product skim milk powder amounted to 5,522,000 lb. an increase of 3.7 million pounds over last year and a decrease of 197 thousand pounds from last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 749,000 gallons as compared with 725,000 gallons on April 1, 1951. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 302,000 lb. on April 1, 1952.

EGGS

The April 1, 1952 report shows 244,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 69,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 6,607,000 lb. being 2.7 million pounds higher than the 1951 figure. The net "into-storage" movement for March 1952 was 576 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 778 thousand pounds during March 1951.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on April 1, 1952 was higher than last year by 15.5 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 4.4 million pounds is shown for the month of March 1952. Chickens in stock amounted to 10,857,000 lb., fowl to 7,834,000 lb. and turkeys 5,157,000 lb., not including estimates. There were 100,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on April 1, 1952.
