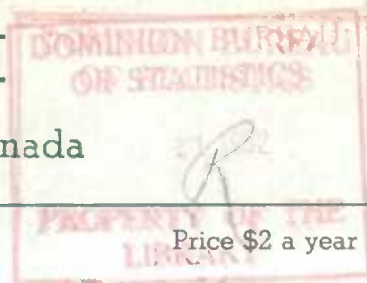

SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS

September 1, 1952

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on September 1, 1952 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 71,279,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 54,303,000 lb. while dairy factories held 16,871,000 lb. Butter in transit amounted to 105,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 15.6 million pounds. The five-year average of September 1 stocks is 62,499,000 lb. The August, 1952 'into-storage' movement was 12.4 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 9.8 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 47,472,000 lb. consisting of 45,784,000 lb. Canadian, 1,536,000 lb. imported and 152,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 6.2 million pounds and showed an 'into-storage' movement of 3.9 million pounds for August, 1952.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 93,481,000 lb. which was an increase of 32.8 million lb. over last year. The 'into-storage' movement of evaporated whole milk for August, 1952 was 11.4 million pounds. The chief by-product, skim-milk powder amounted to 17,224,000 lb. an increase of 7.2 million pounds over last year and an increase of 4.4 million pounds over last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 901,000 gallons as compared with 982,000 gallons on September 1, 1951. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 1,132,000 lb. on September 1, 1952 while last year, at the same date, they amounted to 1,771,000 lb.

EGGS

The September 1, 1952 report shows 151,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 43,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 10,298,000 lb. being 3.2 million pounds higher than the 1951 figure. The 'into-storage' movement for August, 1952 was 372,000 pounds as compared with a similar movement of 29,000 pounds during August, 1951.

DRESSED POULTRY

Total poultry stocks on September 1, 1952 were higher than last year by 608 thousand pounds. An 'out-of-storage' movement of 1.9 million pounds is shown for the month of August, 1952. Chickens in stock amounted to 4,553,000 lb., fowl to 3,870,000 lb. and turkeys, to 1,690,000 lb. There were 50,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on September 1, 1952 and there were no imported stocks reported.
