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SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on November 1, 1953 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 91,586,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 70,881,000 lb. while dairy factories held 20,672,000 lb., Butter in transit amounted to 35,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 17.7 million pounds. The five year average of November 1 stocks is 66,849,000 lb. The October 1953 "out-of-storage" movement was 2.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 3.3 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 45,07%,000 lb. consisting of 44,963,000 lb. Canadian, and 114,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 1.5 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 2.4 million pounds for October 1953.

CONCENTRATIED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for mamufacturers amounted to 61,335,000 lb. which was a decrease of 21.5 million pounds from last year. The "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for October 1953 was 6.4 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 14,728,000 lb. a decrease of 4.3 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 2.0 million pounds from last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 854,000 gallons as compared with 790,000 gallons on November 1, 1952. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 785,000 lb. on November 1, 1953, last year they amounted to 1,266,000 lb.

EGGS

The November 1, 1953 report shows only 1,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 42,000 cases of fresh eggs and 2,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 5,844,000 lb. being 2.1 million pounds lower than the 1952 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for October 1953 was 1.3 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.2 million pounds during October 1952.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on November 1, 1953 was lower than last year by 2.0 million pounds. An "into-storage movement of 6.3 million pounds is shown for the month of October 1953. Chickens im stock amounted to 6,214,000 lb., fowl to 7,743,000 lb., and turkeys 2,249,000 lb., not including estimates. There were no dressed poultry in transit on November 1, 1953.
