SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on September 1, 1953 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 88,444,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 68,934,000 lb. while dairy factories held 19,475,000 lb., Butter in transit amounted to 35,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 17.1 million pounds. The five year average of September 1 stocks is 63,348,000 lb. The August 1953 "into-storage" movement was 11.3 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 12.1 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 42,699,000 lb. consisting of 42,507,000 lb. Canadian, 2,000 lb. imported and 190,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was higher than last year by 52 thousand pounds and showed an "into-storage" movement of 1.7 million pounds for August 1953.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 72,850,000 lb. which was a decrease of 20.6 million pounds from last year. The "into-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for August 1953 was 5.0 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 15,804,000 lb. a decrease of 1.9 million pounds from last year and an increase of 747 thousand pounds over last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 1,002,000 gallons as compared with 935,000 gallons on September 1, 1952. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 884,000 lb. on September 1, 1953, last year they amounted to 1,132,000 lb.

EGGS

The September 1, 1953 report shows 71,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 54,000 cases of fresh eggs and 1,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 7,804,000 lb. being 2.6 million pounds lower than the 1952 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for August 1953 was 145 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 454 thousand pounds during August 1952.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on September 1, 1953 was lower than last year by 4.6 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 1.1 million pounds is shown for the month of August 1953. Chickens in stock amounted to 2,356,000 lb., fowl to 2,680,000 lb., and turkeys 1,463,000 lb., not including estimates. There were 25,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on September 1, 1953.
