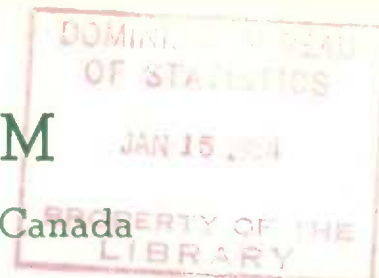

SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on January 1, 1954 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 70,960,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 56,211,000 lb. while dairy factories held 14,714,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 16.6 million pounds. The five year average of January 1 stocks is 46,381,000 lb. The December 1953 "out-of-storage" movement was 11.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 11.8 million pounds last year.

CHEESE

The total stocks of cheese were 33,034,000 lb. consisting of 32,956,000 lb. Canadian, 2,000 lb. imported and 76,000 lb. in transit. The summary total was lower than last year by 7.6 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 3.0 million pounds for December 1953.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 41,018,000 lb. which was a decrease of 14.5 million pounds from last year. The "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for December 1953 was 9.5 million pounds. The chief by-products skim-milk powder amounted to 11,124,000 lb. a decrease of 5.5 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 354 thousand pounds from last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 810,000 gallons as compared with 710,000 gallons on January 1, 1953. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 510,000 lb. on January 1, 1954, last year they amounted to 935,000 lb.

EGGS

The January 1, 1954 report shows 6,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 62,000 cases of fresh eggs. Frozen eggs totalled 4,037,000 lb. being 1.2 million pounds lower than the 1953 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for December 1953 was 894 thousand pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.1 million pounds during December 1952.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on January 1, 1954 was higher than last year by 8.0 million pounds. An "into-storage" movement of 2.0 million pounds is shown for the month of December 1953. Chickens in stock amounted to 11,763,000 lb., fowl to 9,004,000 lb., and turkeys to 7,226,000 lb., not including estimates. There were 25,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on January 1, 1954.
