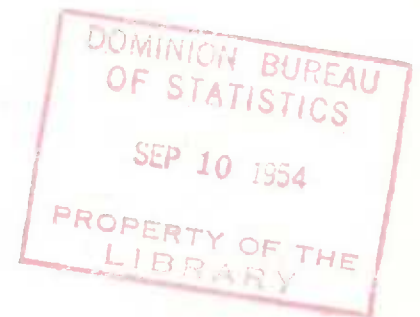

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SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS - SEPTEMBER 1, 1954 1.

CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on September 1, 1954 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 105,834,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 84,465,000 lb. while dairy factories held 21,229,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 16.8 million pounds. The five year average of September 1 stocks is 70,947,000 lb. The August 1954 "into-storage" movement was 12.9 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 11.8 million pounds last year.

CHEDDAR CHEESE

The total stocks of cheddar cheese were 44,132,000 lb. There were no imported or in transit stocks of cheddar cheese on hand September 1, 1954. The summary total was lower than last year by 1.5 million pounds and showed an "into-storage" movement of 4.1 million pounds for August 1954.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 66,647,000 lb. which was a decrease of 6.2 million pounds from last year. The "into-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for August 1954 was 6.3 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 18,269,000 lb. an increase of 2.0 million pounds over last year and an increase of 442 thousand pounds over last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 1,228,000 gallons as compared with 1,019,000 gallons on September 1, 1953. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 589,000 lb. on September 1, 1954, last year they amounted to 947,000 lb.

EGGS

The September 1, 1954 report shows 149,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 36,000 cases of fresh eggs and 1,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 7,955,000 lb. being 88 thousand pounds higher than the 1953 figures. The "into-storage" movement of August 1954 was 39 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 58 thousand pounds during August 1953.

DRESSED POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on September 1, 1954 was higher than last year by 4.6 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 531 thousand pounds is shown for the month of August 1954. Chickens in stock amounted to 4,684,000 lb., fowl to 4,232,000 lb. and turkeys to 2,083,000 lb., not including estimates. There were no dressed poultry in transit on September 1, 1954.
