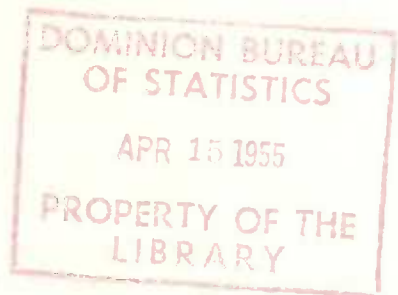

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SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheddar cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on April 1, 1955 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 58,760,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 48,971,000 lb. while dairy factories held 9,719,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 16.5 million pounds. The five year average of April 1 stocks is 24,829,000 lb. The March 1955 "out-of-storage" movement was 10.1 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 8.4 million pounds last year.

CHEDDAR CHEESE

The total stocks of cheddar cheese were 32,641,000 lb. consisting of 31,442,000 lb. Canadian, 933,000 lb. imported and 266,000 lb. in transit on April 1, 1955. The summary total was higher than last year by 10.0 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 3.5 million pounds for March 1955.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 13,870,000 lb. which was a decrease of 3.1 million pounds from last year. The "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for March 1955 was 5.4 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 4,530,000 lb. a decrease of 2.2 million pounds from last year and a decrease of 1.7 million pounds from last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 1,054,000 gallons as compared with 1,019,000 gallons on April 1, 1954. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 23,000 lb. on April 1, 1955, last year they amounted to 77,000 lb.

EGGS

The April 1, 1955 report shows 206,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 54,000 cases of fresh eggs and 1,000 cases of shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 7,032,000 lb. being 2.4 million pounds higher than the 1954 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for March 1955 was 727 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 562 thousand pounds during March 1954.

POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on April 1, 1955 was lower than last year by 6.8 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 4.6 million pounds is shown for the month of March 1955. By kinds, with reported eviscerated quantity in brackets, these stocks include: Chicken 3,197,000 lb. (671,000) lb., Fowl 2,514,000 lb. (655,000) lb. and turkey 6,018,000 lb. (1,563,000) lb. These figures do not include estimates for firms whose reports were not received in time. These were 50,000 lb. dressed poultry in transit on April 1, 1955.
