Memorandum

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SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on July 1, 1955 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 89,977,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 70,670,000 lb. while dairy factories held 19,167,000 lb. The summary total was higher than last year by 15.1 million pounds. The five year average 1950-54 of July 1 stocks is 52,369,000 lb. The June 1955 "into-storage" movement was 22.1 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 22.7 million pounds last year.

CHEDDAR CHEESE

The total stocks of cheddar cheese were 36,928,000 lb. consisting of 36,817,000 lb. Canadian, 35,000 lb. imported and 76,000 lb. in transit on July 1, 1955. The summary total was higher than last year by 2.9 million pounds and showed an "into-storage" movement of 5.7 million pounds for June 1955.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 39,020,000 lb. which was a decrease of 9.9 million pounds from last year. The "into-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for June 1955 was 14.3 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 9,669,000 lb. a decrease of 4.6 million pounds from last year and an increase of 3.4 million pounds over last month. Ice cream stocks amounted to 1,364,000 gallons as compared with 1,305,000 gallons on July 1, 1954. Stocks of frozen cream amounted to 229,000 lb. on July 1, 1955, last year they amounted to 332,000 lb.

EGGS

The July 1, 1955 report shows 269,000 cases of cold storage eggs and 52,000 cases of fresh eggs. There were no shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 9,170,000 lb. being 1.8 million pounds higher than the 1954 figures. The "into-storage" movement for June 1955 was 799 thousand pounds as compared with a similar movement of 1.1 million pounds during June 1954.

POULTRY

The summary total of poultry stocks on July 1, 1955 was lower than last year by 5.5 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 793 thousand pounds is shown for the month of June 1955. By kinds, with reported eviscerated quantity in brackets, these stocks include: Chicken 1,176,000 lb. (282,000) lb., Fowl 1,478,000 lb. (342,000) lb. and turkey 3,848,000 lb. (1,066,000) lb. These figures do not include estimates for firms whose reports were not received in time. There were no stocks of dressed poultry in transit on July 1, 1955.
