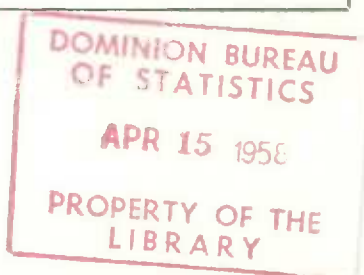

SOURCE AND CONTENT

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.

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CREAMERY BUTTER

At the opening of business on April 1, 1958 the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 37,063,000 lb. Cold Storage warehouses had in store 23,770,000 lb. while dairy factories held 13,188,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 6.9 million pounds. The five year average 1953-57 of April 1 stocks is 47,390,000 lb. The March 1958 "out-of-storage" movement was 9.6 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 14.6 million pounds last year.

CHEDDAR CHEESE

The total stocks of cheddar cheese were 40,386,000 lb. consisting of 40,193,000 lb. Canadian, 3,000 lb. imported and 190,000 lb. in transit on April 1, 1958. The summary total was higher than last year by 11.6 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 4.2 million pounds for March 1958.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 22,063,000 lb. which was an increase of 9.8 million pounds over last year. The "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for March 1958 was 4.7 million pounds. The chief by-product skim-milk powder amounted to 38,811,000 lb. an increase of 35.5 million pounds over last year and a decrease of 3.2 million pounds from last month.

EGGS

The April 1, 1958 report shows 102,000 cases of cold storage eggs, 74,000 cases of fresh eggs and 1,000 cases shell eggs in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 12,375,000 lb. being 5.2 million pounds higher than the 1957 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for March 1958 was 815 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 799 thousand pounds during March 1957.

POULTRY

The summary total of Dressed and Eviscerated poultry stocks on April 1, 1958 was lower than last year by 10.1 million pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 4.5 million pounds is shown for the month of March 1958. By kinds with reported eviscerated quantity in brackets, these stocks include: Chicken 1,764,000 lb. (1,906,000) lb., Fowl 3,086,000 lb. (7,121,000) lb. and turkey 1,364,000 lb. (6,559,000) lb. These figures do not include estimates for firms whose reports were not received in time. There were 25,000 lb. of poultry in transit on April 1, 1958.
