Source and Content

Data for this report are collected by mail questionnaires from dairy factories, concentrated milk manufacturers, public and semi public cold storages, meat packers, wholesale grocers' warehouses and central warehouses of chain grocery stores.

Inventories are taken at manufacturers and wholesale level and firms are required to report all stocks held in their own establishments or in specially rented rooms elsewhere as at the opening of the first business day of the month.

Stocks of butter and cheese in dairy factories are obtained with the co-operation of the provincial governments.



STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS

MARCH 1, 1966

CREAMERY BUTTER:

At the opening of the first business day of March 1966, the stocks of creamery butter on hand in Canada amounted to 44,760,000 lb. Cold storage Warehouses had in store 21,335,000 lb. while dairy factories held 23,425,000 lb. The summary total was lower than last year by 24.2 million pounds. The five-year average 1961-65 of March 1 stocks is 95,894,000 lb. The February 1966 "out-of-storage" movement was 17.5 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 13.5 million pounds last year. Stocks of butter oil amounted to 400 thousand pounds.

CHEESE:

The total stocks of cheddar cheese were 58,308,000 lb. Canadian. There were no stocks reported in transit and no stocks of imported cheddar cheese on hand at March 1, 1966. The summary total was higher than last year by 7.6 million pounds and showed an "out-of-storage" movement of 2.9 million pounds for February, 1966.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS:

Stocks of evaporated whole milk held by or for manufacturers amounted to 13,198,000 lb. which was a decrease of 4.8 million pounds from last year. The "out-of-storage" movement of evaporated whole milk for February, 1966 was 18.9 million pounds. Stocks of the chief by-product, skim milk powder, amounted to 19,006,000 lb., a decrease of 2.9 million pounds from last year and of 2.1 million pounds from last month.

EGGS:

The March 1, 1966 report shows 2,000 cases of cold storage eggs and 56,000 cases of fresh eggs. There were no cases of shell eggs reported in transit. Frozen eggs totalled 4,483,000 lb. being 3.0 million pounds less than the 1965 figures. The "out-of-storage" movement for February, 1966 was 8 thousand pounds as compared with an opposite movement of 13 thousand pounds during February, 1965.

POULTRY MEAT:

The summary total of dressed and eviscerated poultry meat stocks at March 1, 1966 was higher than last year by 472 thousand pounds. An "out-of-storage" movement of 1.3 million pounds is shown for the month of February, 1966. By kind, the dressed and eviscerated quantities in stocks, the latter in brackets, were: Chicken, 326,000 lb. (8,625,000) lb., Fowl, 181,000 lb. (5,488,000) lb. and Turkey, 197,000 lb. (23,917,000) lb. These figures do not include estimates for firms whose reports were not received on time. There were no stocks of poultry meat reported in transit on March 1, 1966.
