STOCKS OF CANADIAN FRUIT AND VEGETABLES, NOVEMBER 1, 1940

APPLES.

Canadian apples held in Cold and Common storage, including stocks held by commercial growers, were 2,078,697 barrels, 3,410,921 boxes and 885,693 bushels in other containers. Converting all containers to bushels the combined figures were 7,532,705 bushels compared with 11,176,092 bushels at November 1, 1939 and 1,887,946 bushels last month. The apparent net "Into-Storage" movement was 5,6 million bushels.

PEARS.

Canadian pears including those in the hands of commercial growers were reported amounting to 172,917 bushels. In addition there were 6,813 bushels of imported on hand.

FROZEN AND SO2 FRUIT. Frozen fruit stocks are shown as straight frozen, two parts fruit to one part sugar, three parts fruit to one part sugar, and as pulp. The total was 9,423,962 lb. (including 760,000 lb. estimated for firms failing to report on time) as compared with 7.5 million 1b. last year and 11.3 million 1b. last month.

Fruit in SO2 totalled 6,757,061 lb. including an estimate of 2,200,000 1b. for firms failing to report,

Frozen and SO2 fruit combined were 16,181,023 lb. including the estimate. The combined figures last year at the same date were 13,900,739 lb. Including the estimate, there was a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 4.2 million 1b. during October, 1940. During October 1939 there was an "Out-of-Storage" movement of 1.7 million 1b.

VEGETABLES. Holdings of Canadian-grown vegetables, including those held by commercial growers were as follows :-

Potato holdings amounted to 311,620 tons. In addition, on November 1, 1940 there were reports showing 547 tons Imported potatoes.

Onion stocks were reported as 15,495 tons, as compared with 22,502 tons at the same date last year, and 3,917 tons on October 1, 1940.


Celery stocks were reported as 209,374 crates, as compared with 367,666 crates at the same date last year.
