STOCKS OF CANADIAN FRUIT AND VEGETABLES, MAY 1, 1941

APPLES.

Canadian apples held in Cold and Common storage, including stocks held by commercial growers, were 31,735 barrels, 827,502 boxes and 103,245 bushels in other containers. Converting all containers to bushels the combined figures were 1,025,952 bushels compared with 261,861 bushels at May 1, 1940 and 1,774,004 bushels last month. The apparent net "Out-of-Storage" movement was 748 thousand bushels.

PEARS. Stocks of Canadian pears exhausted. There were 1,031 bushels of imported on hand.

FROZEN AND SO2 FRUIT

Frozen fruit stocks are shown as straight frozen, two parts fruit to one part sugar, three parts fruit to one part sugar, and as pulp. The total was 4,993,303 lb. (including 70,000 lb. estimated for firms failing to report on time) as compared with 4.0 million lb. last year and 6.0 million lb. last month.

Fruit in SO2 totalled 5,557,358 lb. including an estimate of 2,150,000 lb. for firms failing to report.


Frozen and SO2 fruit combined were 10,550,661 lb. including the estimate. The combined figures last year at the same date were 7,889,366 lb. Including the estimate there was a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 2.5 million lb. during April 1941. During April 1940 there was a similar movement of 1.1 million lb.

VEGETABLES. Holdings of Canadian-grown vegetables, including those held by commercial growers, were as follows:-

Potato holdings amounted to 73,223 tons, a decrease from last month of 35 thousand tons. In addition on May 1, 1941 there were reports showing 471 tons Imported potatoes.

Onion stocks were reported as 2,813 tons, as compared with 3,228 tons at the same date last year, and 4,657 tons on April 1, 1941. In addition there were 308 tons of Imported Onions.

Celery. Canadian stocks are now exhausted. There were, however, 8,658 crates of Imported on hand.


