STOCKS OF FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

APPLES: Canadian apples held in cold and common storage were 8,185,000 bushels, compared with 8,231,000 bushels last year.

FEARS.

There were 602,000 bushels of Fears on hand on November 1, 1960.

FRUIT, FROZEN AND IN PRESERVATIVES:

There were 6,542,000 lb. of fruit in "Containers 1 lb. and Under" while for "Over 1 lb." the total was 25,412,000 lb.

The stocks of fruit in sulphur dioxide or in benzoate of soda totalled 9,399,000 lb. A year ago they amounted to 11,726,000 lb. and last month 8,772,-000 lb. The total of all fruit, frozen and in preservatives was 41,353,000 lb. as compared with 46,073,000 lb. last year and 42,660,000 lb. last month.

VEGETABLES Holdings of vegetables were:

Stocks of potatoes were 17,531,000 hundredweight, as compared with 17,833,000 hundredweight last year. Stocks of onions were reported as 1,627,000 bushels as compared with 1,217,000 bushels last year. Stocks of carrots amounted to 1,003,000 bushels as compared with 800,000 bushels last year. Stocks of cabbage decreased to 169,000 bushels from 200,000 bushels last year. There were 117,000 crates of celery on hand. Last year at November 1 there were 45,000 crates.

VEGETABLES, FROZEN AND IN BRINE:

"Containers 1 lb. and Under" showed a total of 11,430,000 lb. while for "Over 1 lb." the total was 42,088,000 lb. There were 6,189,000 lb. held "In Brine".

NOTE AS TO SCURCE AND CONTENT

The data contained in this report represent stocks of fruit and vegetables; fresh, frozen and in preservatives, held by food processors cold storage, fruit warehouses, wholesalers and in storages of commercial growers in certain areas of commercial production. Inventories of fresh fruit and vegetables are obtained through the inspection services of the Canada Department of Agriculture.
