STOCKS OF FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

APPLES Canadian apples held in cold and common storage were 233,000 bushels, compared with 595,000 bushels last year.

PEARS There were 2,000 bushels of pears on hand on June 1, 1960.

FRUIT, FROZEN AND IN PRESERVATIVES

There were 3,105,000 lb. of fruit in "Containers 1 lb. and Under" while for "Over 1 1b." the total was 16,770,000 1b.

The stocks of fruit in sulphur dioxide or in benzoate of soda totalled 9,613,000 lb. A year ago they amounted to 8,299,000 lb. and last month 9,771,000 1b. The total of all fruit, frozen and in preservatives was 29,488,000 lb. as compared with 31,858,000 lb. last year and 32,603,000 lb. last month.

VEGETABLES Holdings of vegetables were:

Stocks of potatoes were 1,387,000 hundredweight, as compared with 2.051.000 hundredweight last year. Stocks of onions were reported as 78.000 bushels as compared with 86,000 bushels last year. Stocks of carrots amounted to 91,000 bushels as compared with 65,000 bushels last year. Stocks of cabbage increased to 47,000 bushels from 32,000 bushels last year. There were 16,000 crates of celery on hand. Last year at June 1 there were 19,000 crates.

VEGETABLES, FROZEN AND IN BRINE

"Containers 1 1b. and Under" showed a total of 7,611,000 lb. while for "Over 1 lb." the total was 15,046,000 lb. There were 6,081,000 lb. held "In Brine".

NOTE AS TO SOURCE AND CONTENT

The data contained in this report represent stocks of fruit and vegetables; fresh, frozen and in preservatives, held by food processors cold storage, fruit warehouses, wholesalers and in storages of commercial growers in certain areas of commercial production. Inventories of fresh fruit and vegetables are obtained through the inspection services of the Canada Department of Agriculture.
