STOCKS OF FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

APPLES: Canadian apples held in cold and common storage were 2,149,000 bushels, compared with 2,243,000 bushels last year.

PEARS:

There were 19,000 bushels of Pears on hand on March 1, 1961.

FRUIT, FROZEN AND IN PRESERVATIVES:

There were 4,388,000 lb. of fruit in "Containers 1 lb. and Under" while for "Over 1 lb." the total was 20,680,000 lb.

The stocks of fruit in sulphur dioxide or in benzoate of soda totalled 9,339,000 lb. A year ago they amounted to 11,608,000 lb. and last month 9,392,000 lb. The total of all fruit, frozen and in preservatives was 34,407,000 lb. as compared with 40,000,000 lb. last year and 36,391,000 lb. last month.

VEGETABLES: Holdings of vegetables were:

Stocks of potatoes were 8,117,000 hundredweight, as compared with 7,432,000 hundredweight last year. Stocks of onions were reported as 501,000 bushels as compared with 468,000 bushels last year. Stocks of carrots amounted to 154,000 bushels as compared with 211,000 bushels last year. Stocks of cabbage increases to 66,000 bushels from 60,000 bushels last year. There were 29,000 crates of celery on hand. Last year at March 1 there were 16,000 crates.

VEGETABLES, FROZEN AND IN BRINE:

"Containers 1 lb. and Under" showed a total of 10,899,000 lb while for "Over 1 lb." the total was 29,383,000 lb. There were 6,697,000 lb. held "In Brine".

NOTE AS TO SOURCE AND CONTENT

The data contained in this report represent stocks of fruit and vegetables; fresh, frozen and in preservatives, held by food processors cold storage, fruit warehouses, wholesalers and in storages of commercial growers in certain areas of commercial production. Inventories of fresh fruit and vegetables are obtained through the inspection services of the Canada Department of Agriculture.
