EXPLANATORY NOTES

This report is one in a series of about 130 publications which present the results of the 1958 Census of Manufactures. Most reports in this series refer to specific industries, but there are summary reports for Canada and the provinces and for major industry groups. An annual Census of Manufactures has been carried out by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since 1916.

Industry statistics given in these reports refer to number of establishments, employees, salaries and wages, cost of materials, supplies, fuel and electricity, gross value of shipments, inventories and value added by manufacturing. Details of materials used and products shipped are also given. Descriptions of the principal industry statistics, with special reference to 1958, are as follows:

Period Covered

Firms are asked to submit figures for the calendar year, if at all possible, and most reports are on this basis. Financial year reports for periods differing from the calendar year are accepted in instances where the firms find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. However the data on employees, salaries and wages are requested on a calendar year basis in all cases.

Establishment

Data for the annual census is collected on an establishment basis. A firm with more than one plant is required to file a report for each plant. In most cases an establishment is a complete factory. Sometimes, however, a plant is divided into two or more establishments when it carries out operations classifiable to different industries and when separate accounting records are available. Usually the statistics for an establishment relate only to the manufacturing activities. Other activities such as construction at the plant by its own employees. wholesale or retail activities carried on at the plant location, etc., are not included. Plants engaged solely in repair work (except in the case of furniture, shipbuilding, boat building, aircraft and railway rolling stock industries) are not included but plants occupied in assembling parts into complete units are included.

Employees

Administrative and office employees include all executives and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional and technical employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the working foremen level and clerical employees. Working owners and partners are also included in this category.

Production and related workers include all other factory workmen whether paid on a monthly, weekly, hourly or piece-work basis. Working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise are included, as are maintenance, warehousing and delivery staffs. Employees on new construction work, in retail or wholesale operations, on outside piece work etc., are not included.

Production workers are reported by months, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by twelve. This procedure is followed even though the plant did not operate in all months. Figures on employment refer to calendar years whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of the employees described above, including salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, the value of room and board where provided, deductions for income tax and social services such as sickness and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc., as well as any other allowances forming part of the employees' wages. Payments for overtime are included.

Salaries refer to amounts paid to administrative and office employees. Withdrawals by working owners or partners for normal living expenses for self and family are included but not their withdrawals for income tax. Wages refer to the amounts paid to production and related workers as defined above. Data on earnings refer to the calendar year whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Cost of Fuel and Electricity

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used, (including fuel used in cars and trucks), not to purchases unless the quantities are the same. Values refer to the laid-down cost at the works, including freight, duty, etc.

Materials and Supplies Used

Figures represent quantities and laid-down cost values, at the works, of materials and supplies actually used during the year whether purchased from others or received as transfers from other plants of the reporting company. Amounts paid to other manufacturers for work done on materials owned by the reporting company are included. Returnable containers or any other items charged to capital account are not included. Fuels are not included. Goods bought from others or received as transfers from other plants of reporting companies

for resale without further processing are not included. Maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to capital account are included.

Factory Shipments

Factory shipments refer to shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting plant or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting plant for work done. All products and by-products shipped from the establishment are included whether for domestic use, export, or for government departments. Transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing units of the reporting firm are included. Goods bought or received as transfers and resold without further processing are not included. Values are computed on f.o.b. plant or plant warehouse basis, and do not include sales tax or excise duties. Values of containers not returnable are included. Amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by others are included.

In a few industries such as shipbuilding, aircraft, etc., where work on principal products extend over a relatively long period, the value of production is recorded rather than the value of shipments. For those industries production is computed from the value of deliveries of complete units during the year plus the value of work done during the year on unfinished units less the value of work done in previous years on finished units delivered in the year under review.

Inventories

Values represent the book values of manufacturing inventories owned and held at the reporting plant. Figures include inventories held in warehouses or selling outlets which have been included with plant operations for purposes of reporting shipments.

Value Added by Manufacturing

Figures are computed from value of shipments plus or minus changes in inventories of finished

goods and goods in process less cost of materials, fuel and electricity. This figure is sometimes referred to as net production.

Standard Industrial Classification

The Standard Industrial Classification Manual, prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, provides for 135 three-digit industries in the manufacturing sector, arranged in 17 major groups. Reporting establishments are classified or allotted to specific industries on the basis of the value of principal products made or shipped.

Short Forms

Prior to 1949 all manufacturing firms, regardless of size, were required to complete a standard form annually covering all census details, but for later years an effort was made to ease the reporting burden for smaller firms which usually do not maintain regular records in the required detail. A modified or short form was introduced in 1949 asking for the total value of shipments only, or in industries with a large number of small firms, for total value of shipments and quantities and values of a few principal products. Using the ratio of value of shipments in the current year to value of shipments in the base year, 1948, estimates of other census data were made for each plant for inclusion in the regular compilations. In general, the cut-off point for short forms was set at \$50,000 gross value of shipments annually, but there were lower cut-offs for a number of industries in which the small firms accounted for a larger share of total shipments. About 40 per cent of the total number of establishments reported on the modified or short form. They accounted for less than 3 per cent of the total value. In 1958, to establish a new base year, the small firms were again asked to report data on employees, salaries and wages, and other principal statistics together with some detail on material and products.

¹ To arrive at the National Accounts concept of ''gross domestic product at factor cost'', it would be necessary to subtract also the cost of office supplies used, advertising, insurance and other goods and services obtained from other businesses. Data on these inputs are not collected on the annual Census of Manufactures. Value added figures for ''The primary industries and construction'' are published in D.B.S. publication 61—202, Survey of Production.

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With the adoption of the New Standard Classification of Industry in 1949, it is necessary to make some explanation of the changes involved. Reports previous to 1949, (based on the Vegetable Products Group) included only those industries in which the raw materials used had a vegetable origin. In the new classification, some industries based on Animal Products origin, have been added, but The Rubber Industry and The Tobacco and Tobacco Products Industry have been deleted and reclassified into other groups. Those Industries of Animal Products origin, which have been added to comprise the present Foods and Beverages Group are indicated in Table 3 of this report. In this regard, a new Industry was added in 1957 when Milk Pasteurizing Plants were re-classified as manufacturing establishments. Prior to 1957, pasteurizing of milk was considered a merchandising activity. For principal statistics on milk pasteurizing plants see page 10.

In Table 1 will be found the historical picture of the Foods and Beverages Group for the years 1925 to 1958 inclusive. The entry of Newfoundland into Confederation in 1949 marked an important event in the history of Canada. For the first time statistically, the data for Newfoundland were included. Combined with the Maritime provinces, the four provinces are now known as "The Atlantic Provinces". In 1949 the new province reported 31 establishments having a gross value of production of \$9,775,000. For strict comparability of the historical tabulation, the provincial statistics for Newfoundland (See Table 2) should be deleted from the 1949 to 1958 data in Table 1. The extent to which the industrial production of Newfoundland has

increased the gross value of production in individual industries is recorded separately in the several reports such as: The Carbonated Beverages Industry, The Bread and other Bakery Products Industry, The Brewing Industry, The Fruit and Vegetable Preparations Industry, the Slaughtering and Meat Packing Industry and others.

The Foods and Beverages group is one which makes a substantial contribution to the foreign trade of Canada. Commodities such as flour; cereal foods; meats, frozen and canned; fish, frozen, canned and dried; cheese; and distilled liquors are among the more important items of export. Most of the main export commodities are recorded, together with imports of foods items in Tables 14 and 15 respectively.

The Foods and Beverages group accounted for 20.4 per cent of the selling value of factory shipments of all the manufacturing industries of Canada in 1958. Of the total estimated value of \$22,163,186,308, this major group's share was \$4,528,889,289. A total of 8,417 establishments employed 190,445 persons who received \$623,289,596 in salaries and wages. This was a decrease of .9 p.c. in employment and an increase of 5.6 p.c. in salaries and wages. Cost of raw materials consumed at \$2,939,312,503 was 8.7 per cent more than in 1957.

The following summary shows the importance of the group in the manufacturing universe of the Canadian economy, currently for the year 1958, while the historical comparison for significant years, back to 1925 follows immediately.

The selling value of factory shipments increased 8.6 per cent in 1958 over the previous year's total and was more than five times the dollar value of 1925.

The increase over 1957 was due primarily to increased prices but the physical volume rose by 4.8 per cent. However, because of consistent increases in volume or prices, or a combination of both, value added by manufacture has steadily

increased over the period beginning in 1935. A slight recession, experienced by industry in 1945 and 1946 because of the cessation of the Second World War, did not affect the upward production trend of the foods and beverages group. The index of the physical volume of production (basis: gross value) and the value of shipments of the ten leading industries within the foods group are given respectively in the following two tables:

In the ten-year period 1949 to 1959, the physical volume of production of foods and beverages has increased consistently. In the same period, industrial and manufacturing volumes declined slightly in 1954 but recovered in the 1955-1957 period. Preliminary figures for 1958 show another drop in these two indexes but recovery is again estimated upward in 1959. Estimates for the first quarter of 1960 indicate a record industrial production while the manufacturing results should be considerably improved over the previous year.

Considering the foods and beverages industries as a major group, the volume indexes of every Industry within the group are estimated, with one exception, to have increased significantly in 1959. The best showing was made by meat products, up 10.4 per cent from 1957. Judging by preliminary first-quarter estimates, the upward trend in these industries has continued into 1960.

While population in Canada has increased by almost 30 per cent between 1949 and 1959, the gross value of shipments of all manufacturers has risen to an estimated 23,229 million dollars, an increase of 86 per cent. In the same period the gross value of factory shipments of foods and beverages has risen from 2,882 million dollars to an estimated 4,682 millions, up 62 per cent due to increased volume and rising prices.

The salaries and wages paid by all manufacturing industries in 1949 amounted to 2,592 million dollars and rose steadily to reach 4,820 millions in 1957, an all-time high and approximately 86 per cent above the 1949 total. There was a slight decrease in 1958 to 4,808 million dollars. Salaries and wages paid by foods and beverages industries increased over 87 per cent to 623 millions in 1958. This latter group continued to pay over 13 per cent of the total of salaries and wages paid by all manufacturing industries in 1958.

Comparing estimated data on the value of factory shipments for the first quarter of 1960 with similar periods in 1959 and 1958, it would appear that continued growth in the value of shipments of foods and beverages industries together with further expansion in all manufacturing industries may be anticipated.

Other major factors in our economy which directly affect the growth of the manufacturing universe are imports, exports and gross investments. Statistical tables covering these fields are given on page 9 following.

Total value of exports of commodities from Canada reached a record high in 1958, recovering sharply from the declines suffered in 1953 and 1954. For products of the foods and beverages group, the high was reached in 1952 and exports of this type steadily declined through 1953-55. In 1956, exports increased about 24 per cent over 1955 but dropped again in 1957 to the 1955 level. In 1958, total value of exports of foods and beverages again rose but did not reach the 1956 level. Exports of food commodities in 1959 are slightly below the previous year.

Total value of imports of commodities into Canada likewise attained a record high in 1956 dropping slightly in 1957 and to a greater degree in 1958, returning to almost the 1957 level in 1959. Preliminary 1960 results for the first quarter would seem to indicate a continued upward trend. Imports of foods and beverages reached an all time high in 1959, and showed a slight increase in the first quarter of 1960.

In the foregoing table, gross investment of new capital in Canada in the period under review was at its lowest level in 1954. In direct contrast, investment of new capital in the foods and beverages group of industries increased from 78.7 millions of dollars in 1949 to 109.1 millions of dollars in 1956. Inventory investment, which became available first

in 1954, has increased the new investment in fixed assets to 151.3 millions of dollars in 1956. A slight decline from this peak to 145.3 millions occurred in 1957 and further to 144.1 millions in 1958. The decrease was due entirely to reduced investment in inventories and in both years.

In 1951 and previous years, the Foods and Beverages group of industries was on a production basis and "Value added by manufacture" was computed by subtracting the total of the cost of raw materials and cost of fuel and electricity from the value of production. In 1952 a change was made to value of factory shipments instead of value of production and in computing the value added the shipments figures were used in exactly the same manner as were production figures in the earlier period. Most industries in the group immediately made this change but others such as the Bread and Other Bakery Products Industry, the Brewing Industry, the Fruit and Vegetable Preparations Industry, were not converted until 1954. In 1954, a question was added to all annual schedules to ask for data on opening and closing inventories of raw materials, goods in process and finished goods. In 1954 and 1955 only the change in opening and closing inventories of finished goods was taken into account in calculating value added. In this instance, there were two exceptions namely, the Distilling Industry and the Wine Industry where the change in opening and closing inventories was extended to include goods in process. In 1956 and subsequent years the change in goods in process inventories was added to the change in finished goods inventories for all industries and this total was applied to the value of factory shipments to arrive at the value of production. When the value of production was determined in this manner, the total of the cost of raw materials and fuel and electricity was subtracted to arrive at the "Value added by manufacture".

The following summary using the change in the value of inventories is given to show how "Value added by manufacture" was determined for this period.

Historical series on "Value added by manufacture" is included in Table 1 but further detail on value added for 1958 by industries is given in Table 6. Additional information on value of manufacturing inventories held at plant or plant warehouse levels is given in Table 7A by industries and in Table 7B by provinces for all industries within the Foods and Beverages group. Data, similar to the above summary are published in most annual reports for 1958.

Previous to 1957, milk pasteurizing and bottling plants were considered as retail merchandising establishments and, therefore, were not surveyed by Census of Industry. Recently, Standard Classification of Industry has included such establishments as manufacturing. Consequently, milk plants are included for the first time in standard tabulations for 1957. The additional detail for 1958 provided in the following provincial principal statistics table will assist those interested in making certain analysis beyond those which are provided in standard tables.
