

# THE BISCUIT INDUSTRY

1949

In 1949 reports were received from fifty-two establishments whose principal products were biscuits, plain and fancy; biscuits, soda; and ice cream cones. The definition of biscuits, as understood by the Bureau, is a product which keeps indefinitely and is capable of being packaged, such as crackers, machine-made cookies, pretzels and shortbread.

Establishments classified in this category produced goods to the value of \$59,635,709, gave employment to 6,715 persons who received \$10,608,646 in salaries and wages; and spent \$28,561,885 for materials.

It should be noted that statistics for Newfoundland have been included with the 1949 tables. As there are only two firms with three establishments manufacturing biscuits etc., the figures have been included with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick in order to prevent disclosure of individual information. The number of establishments reporting in 1949 was 52, and were located by provinces as follows; Newfoundland 3; Nova Scotia 2; New Brunswick 3; Quebec 17; Ontario 15; Manitoba 2; Saskatchewan 1; Alberta 3; and British Columbia 6.

The industry as a whole operated on a higher level in 1949 than in 1948. The total value of production increased from \$51,409,428 to \$58,635,709, an increase of \$8,226,281 or 16.0 per cent. For biscuits, plain and fancy, the physical volume of production increased by 11,565,577 pounds or 8.2 per cent; while biscuits, soda, increased by 3,327,318 pounds or 7.0 per cent.

In 1947, 179,955 worth of matzos and passover products were imported. With the establishment in 1948 of a branch plant in Canada by an American firm, the domestic demand for these products is now taken care of by Canadian labour and materials. There is, therefore, no need for the importation of these items.

Only a small quantity of biscuits were exported, about 1.2 per cent of the total produced.

Detailed statistics of production, employment, materials used, imports and exports etc. are given in the tables following.

Now they are requested to report only the warehouse and sales staff working at the plant.
