

# THE BISCUIT INDUSTRY

1953

Beginning in 1952, the bureau changed its policy with regard to the collection of statistics on the production of manufactured goods. Firms in several industries, where year-end inventory changes were known to be insignificant, were requested to report value of shipments f.o.b. plant instead of gross value of production. This changeover should result in better consumption data and should, eventually, provide industry with better statistics for economic analysis.

In 1953 reports were received from 47 establishments whose principal products were biscuits plain and fancy; biscuits, soda; and ice cream cones. The definition of biscuits as accepted by the Bureau, is a product which keeps indefinitely and is capable of being packaged, such as crackers, machine-made cookies, pretzels, and short bread.

The gross value of shipments for the year 1953 amounted to \$75,515,408, a very slight decrease from \$75,650,100 in 1952. The industry employed

6,781 persons and paid them \$14,271,755 in salaries and wages. The cost of raw materials used in production during the same period amounted to \$34,603,257. While there was little change in the gross value of shipments in 1953, the volume of production showed a small increase over 1952. Salaries and wages continued to rise but cost of materials decreased slightly. Production and value of the main commodities in this industry are shown in Table 4.

The 47 establishments in 1953 were located as follows: Newfoundland, 3; Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 2; Quebec, 16; Ontario, 13; Manitoba, 2; Saskatchewan, 1; Alberta, 4; and British Columbia 5. It should be noted that statistics for Newfoundland have been included in all tables since 1949.

Details of statistics on production, employment, materials used, imports and exports, etc. are given in the following tables.
