

THE BISCUIT INDUSTRY

1957

Beginning in 1952, the Bureau changed its policy with regard to the collection of statistics on the production of manufactured goods. Firms in several industries, where year-end inventory changes were known to be insignificant, were requested to report value of shipments f.o.b. plant instead of gross value of production. This changeover should result in better consumption data and should, eventually, provide industry with better statistics for economic analysis.

In 1957 reports were received from 44 establishments whose principal products were biscuits plain and fancy; biscuits, soda; and ice cream cones. The definition of biscuits as accepted by the Bureau, is a product which keeps indefinitely and is capable of being packages, such as crackers, machine-made cookies, pretzels, and short bread.

The gross value of shipments for the year 1957 amounted to \$78,202,784 an increase from \$76,610,411 in 1956. The industry employed 6,245 persons and paid them \$15,753,469 in salaries and wages. The cost of raw materials used in production during the same period amounted to \$38,804,082. Production and value of the main commodities in this industry are shown in Table 3.

The 44 establishments in 1957 were located as follows: Newfoundland, 3; Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 3; Quebec, 15; Ontario, 12; Manitoba, 3; Saskatchewan, 1; Alberta, 3; and British Columbia, 3. It should be noted that statistics for Newfoundland have been included in all tables since 1949.

Details of statistics on production, employment, materials used, imports and exports, etc. are given in the following tables.

² Figures for "Value added by manufacture" are obtained by subtracting cost of materials used and cost of fuel and electricity from value of production. In 1952 and 1953 value of shipments was used since the value of production could not be ascertained. In 1954 and 1955 value of production was computed by using the value of shipments plus or minus the increase or decrease in finished goods inventory. Beginning in 1956 goods in process was included with finished goods to arrive at value of production.

³ Beginning in 1952, gross value of production is replaced by gross value of shipments f.o.b. plant. (See text above).

Note: Profits or losses cannot be estimated from Census figures as no data are collected for certain expense items, such as interest, rent, depreciation, taxes, insurance, advertising etc.




