THE BREAD AND OTHER BAKERY PRODUCTS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1932.

A report on the bread and other bakery products industry is presented herewith. The total number of firms reporting was 2,861, and were located by provinces as follows: - Prince Edward Island eight, Nova Scotia sixty two, New Brunswick seventy, Quebec 887, Ontario 1,111, Manitoba 136, Saskatchewan 158, Alberta 162 and British Columbia and the Yukon 267.

The statistics here given relate only to those firms whose principal products were bread, buns, pies, cakes and pastry. This report must not be considered as comprehensive, as these commodities are also produced as secondary products of the biscuit and confectionery industry for which a separate report is published.

Hotels, restaurants and public institutions which bake their own bread are not required to report their operations, and statistics relating to these are, therefore, not included in this report.

The production of bread and other bakery products forms an industry of considerable importance in the industrial life of the country. It is one of the leading industries and in 1932 ranked ninth in value of products made and fifth in the amount of salaries and wages paid. The 2,861 establishments classified in this category reported in 1932 a capital investment of \$48,961,175, they furnished employment to 16,856 persons who were paid \$15,909,805 in salaries and wages and produced goods that had a selling value at the factory of \$53,450,352. They also spent \$23,431,275 for materials, most of which are of domestic origin, thus contributing materially to the prosperity of the agricultural industry as well as several other Canadian manufacturing industries.

In comparison with the year 1931, there was a decrease of fifty-one in the number of establishments, \$5,305,935 in the total capital investment, 1,480 in the total number of employees, \$2,952,799 in the amount paid in salaries and wages, \$5,188,501 in the cost of materials used and \$11,367,875 in the gross value of production. The decrease in production, however, was not as great as these figures would indicate. The volume of production declined only by 9.7 per cent as compared with a drop of 8.1 per cent in the number of persons employed, 15.7 per cent in the amount paid out in salaries and wages and 17.5 per cent in the value of production.

The principal products of the industry in the order of their importance as indicated by their values were: - bread \$40,110,843, pies, cakes, cookies and pastry \$9,978,733 and buns \$2,463,042.

NOTE: To avoid delay in publishing the report on the bread and other bakery products industry in Canada, the 1931 figures showing the principal statistics by cities were included, as the 1932 figures are not available.

Imports and Exports.

The imports of manufactured commodities in the baking industry are not of sufficient importance to have a separate import classification, but are included in imports under the item "flavouring powders, custard powders, jelly powders, sweetened breads, pies, cakes and puddings". One item only is shown separately, that of "Passover bread" which in the calendar year 1932 was valued at \$142,006 all of which came from the United States.

Exports similarly are combined in the export classification under the head of "biscuits and bread" so that it is not possible to give separate information regarding the export of either commodity.

The weight of a loaf of bread throughout the Dominion is not standardized, but is regulated by municipal by-laws in the various provinces, except in Ontario, where under R.S.O., chap. 224, the standard weight of the loaf is fixed at 24 and 48 ounces, except that in the case of "small bread" the limit is fixed at 12 ounces. According to information collected by the Bureau of Statistics the average weight of a loaf in the previnces may be stated as follows: -

Prince Edward Island, Mova Scotia and New Brunswick at 12 pounds or 24 ounces.

Quebec - in certain municipalities at 12 pound or 24 ounces, while in the remaining parts of the province it is variously stated at 4, 5 and 6 pounds.

Origino - as 20 and 48 cuncer, except in the case of "small bread".

Manitoba - generally at 16 and 20 ounces, except in outlying portions of the province where it is stated at 3 pounds.

Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia report 10, 18 and 20 ounces as the average weight of the loaf which is regulated by municipal by-laws.
