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THE BREAD AND OTHER BAKERY PRODUCTS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1941.

A report on the bread and other bakery products industry is presented here-with. The total number of firms reporting was 3,034, and were located by provinces as follows: Prince Edward Island, 13; Nova Scotia, 94; New Brunswick, 80; Quebec, 992; Ontario, 1,180; Manitoba, 187; Saskatchewan, 112; Alberta, 159; British Columbia, 266; and Northwest Territories, 1.

Hotels, restaurants and public institutions which bake their own bread are not required to report their operations, and statistics relating to these are, therefore, not included.

In Canada for many years breadmaking was for the most part a domestic art, but with the development of towns and cities the baking of bread gradually passed from the domestic circle to the family baker. This continued for a long period, until at the beginning of the present century, a new phase was marked. With the advent of mechanical power and automatic processes, also the improvement in transportation, the bread industry has made rapid progress within the last decade. Before the present war it ranked tenth in value of products made, third in the number of persons employed and sixth in the amount of salaries and wages paid. With the tremendous expansion in war production, however, the relative importance of the industry declined.

The 3,034 establishments classified in this category reported in 1941 a capital investment of \$53,475,380, they furnished employment to 24,969 persons who were paid \$25,919,986 in salaries and wages, and produced goods which had a selling value of \$92,116,507. They also spent \$44,172,928 for materials, most of which are of domestic origin.

A substantial improvement in the operations of the industry was reported in 1941. The value of products increased by \$6,490,079 as compared with the previous year. There was also an increase of 1,026 in the number of persons employed and \$2,410,373 in the salaries and wages paid.

The principal products of the industry, as indicated by their values, were in order of their importance, as follows: Bread, \$57,934,327; pies, cakes, cookies and pastries, \$27,790,184; and buns, \$5,321,226. It might be of interest to note that out of the \$44,172,928 paid out for materials, \$18,706,456 or 42 per cent was spent for 4,237,171 barrels of flour. A variety of materials are used, listed among them being yeast, shortening, sugar, malt, milk, nuts, cocoanut, frozen eggs, oils, such as corn, cottonseed, and soya bean.

THE WEIGHT OF A LOAF OF BREAD

According to information collected by the Bureau of Statistics, the average weight of a loaf in the provinces may be stated as follows:

Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick -

1½ pounds or 24 ounces, except in the case of "small bread".

Quebec -

In certain municipalities at 1½ pounds or 24 ounces, while in the remaining parts of the province it is variously stated at 4, 5, and 6 pounds.

Ontario -

24 and 48 ounces, except in the case of "small bread".

Manitoba -

Generally at 16 and 20 ounces, except in outlying portions of the province where it is stated at 3 pounds.

Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia -

16, 18 and 20 ounces as the average weight of the loaf, except in the case of "small bread".

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
