

THE BREAKFAST FOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1939.

The report on the breakfast foods industry in Canada for the year 1939 is presented herewith. Statistics published in this report refer only to firms whose principal products are breakfast foods, prepared and unprepared. These products are also manufactured in the flour milling industry which is covered by a separate report.

Production by this industry in 1939 included 61,130,258 pounds of prepared breakfast foods (corn flakes, bran flakes, wheat flakes, puffed grains, shredded wheat, muffets, force, etc.) valued at \$8,190,407; unprepared breakfast foods, 5,703,774 pounds valued at \$524,139, and other products to the value of \$495,032. The total output of "prepared breakfast foods" in 1939, including the production in the flour milling industry, totalled 68,515,660 pounds valued at \$9,273,189. Unprepared cereal products, such as, eatmeal, rolled eats, etc. which are mostly produced in the flour milling industry, are not covered in this report. See table 2 for detailed statistics on production.

There were 36 establishments reporting in the breakfast foods industry in 1939. Of these, fifteen were located in Ontario, three in Manitoba, five in Saskatchewan, eight in Alberta and five in British Columbia. These establishments reported a capital investment in fixed and current assets of \$4,786,352; they furnished employment to 794 persons who were paid \$923,837 in salaries and wages. They also spent \$2,910,687 for materials, and produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$9,209,578. This industry is practically confined to the province of Ontario, which produces over 95 per cent of the total output of the industry.

Compared with the previous year there were decreases of 3 in the number of establishments, \$698,788 in the capital invested, \$854 in the amount of salaries and wages paid, \$1,682,624 in the value of production and \$568,454 in the soat of materials used.

\$2,892,153, a decrease of \$995,263 as compared with the previous year. Imports are small, amounting to only \$105,789 in 1939, an increase of \$14,251 over the 1938 figures.

In 1939 there were 7,385,402 pounds of "prepared breakfast foods" valued at \$1,082,782 and 6,275,587 pounds of "unprepared breakfast foods" valued at \$275,993 produced in the "Flour Milling Industry". "Unprepared cereal products", such as rolled oats, oatmeal, cornmeal, etc., are produced almost exclusively in the "Flour Milling Industry", and are not included above. Stock and poultry foods are produced in the "Stock and Poultry Food Industry", and also in the "Flour Milling Industry". For the total production in Canada of the above products reference should be made to the alphabetical list of products published annually in the report "The Manufacturing Industries of Canada"


