

THE PREPARED BREAKFAST FOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1948

Prior to 1943 this industry included only firms whose principal products were prepared and unprepared breakfast foods. One flour mill whose principal products were flour and feed, and producing large quantities of prepared breakfast foods, was, therefore excluded. This firm now makes two returns, one for the production of flour and feed which is included with the flour milling industry and another for their breakfast food production which is included with the breakfast food industry. We now have, therefore, all firms whose principal products are prepared breakfast foods classified in one industry, so that the figures given in the present report represent practically the total production in Canada of these products.

There were 20 establishments reporting in the breakfast foods industry in 1948, 8 were located in Ontario, 2 in Quebec, 3 in Manitoba, 1 in Saskatchewan, 2 in Alberta and 4 in British Columbia. These establishments furnished employment to 1,140 persons who were paid \$2,370,653 in salaries and wages. They also spent \$8,146,467 for materials, and produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$15,278,827. This industry is practically confined to the province of Ontario which is responsible for over 81 per cent of the total value of production.

Production in 1948 totalled 59,358,140 pounds of prepared breakfast foods (corn flakes, bran flakes, wheat flakes, puffed grains, shredded wheat, muffets, force, etc.) valued at \$11,173,295, unprepared breakfast foods 10,156,262 pounds valued at \$1,139,603 and other products to the value of \$2,965,929, making a total production for the industry amounting to \$15,278,827. Unprepared cereal products, such as oatmeal, rolled oats, etc. which are mainly produced in the flour milling industry are not covered in this report.

Compared with the previous year there was a decrease in the physical volume of production, but a slight increase in the dollar value. The output of prepared breakfast foods decreased by 14,389,482 pounds or almost 20 per cent, while unprepared breakfast cereals increased by 2,447,984 pounds.
