# THE PREPARED BREAKFAST FOODS INDUSTRY <br> 1957

## THE PREPARED BREAKFAST FOODS INDUSTRY

Prior to 1943 this industry included only firms whose principal products were prepared and unprepared breakfast foods. One flour mill whose principal products were flour and feed, but which produced large quantities of prepared breakfast foods, was, therefore excluded. This firm now makes two returns, one for the production of flour and feed which is included with the flour milling industry and another for their breakfast food production which is included with the prepared breakfast foods industry. We now have, therefore, all firms whose principal products are prepared breakfast foods classified in one industry, so that the figures given in the present report represent practically the total production in Canada of these products.

Figures for value added by manufacture, prior to 1952 were obtained by subtracting the cost of materials used, including fuel and electricity, from value of production. In 1952 the gross value of production was replaced by value of factory shipments, f.o.b. plant. As no information on inventory change is available for 1952 and 1953 value added figures for these years were obtained by subtracting from the value of shipments the cost of materials, fuel and electricity. Beginning in 1954 information on the value of year-end inventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses was collected as part of the annual Census of Industry and information thus made available was taken into account in calculating the value added figures.

There were 17 establishments reporting in the prepared breakfast foods industry in 1956, 7 were located in Ontario, 3 in Quebec, 2 in Manitoba, 2 in Alberta and 3 in British Columbia. These establishments furnished employment to 1,402 persons who were paid $\$ 4,984,569$ in salaries and wages and spent $\$ 13,352,637$ for materials. This industry is practically confined to the province of Ortario which is responsible for 90 per cent of the total value of production.

Shipments in 1957 totalled $85,734,742$ pounds of prepared breakfast foods (corn flakes, bran flakes, wheat flakes, puffed grains, shredded wheat, muffets, force, etc.) valued at $\$ 26,613,115$, unprepared breakfast foods $8,823,020$ pounds, valued at $\$ 1,201,670$ and other products to the value of $\$ 4,712,400$. Unprepared cereal products, such as oatmeal, rolled oats, etc. are mainly produced in the flour milling industry and the total production is not shown in this report.

Beginning in 1954 statistics were collected on opening and closing inventory values at each plant. The results have been summarized and are shown in Table 3.

The tables following give detailed statistics of shipments, materials used, employment, etc.
