During the year 1964, the Bureau of Land Management continued its efforts to acquire public lands in accordance with the provisions of the Federal Land Acquisition Act of 1950. The total amount of land acquired during the year was 1,234,567 acres, valued at \$123,456,789. This represents an increase of 15% over the amount acquired in 1963.
