#### THE WINE INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1921

Ottawa, April 1923. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics presents a report on the Wine industry in Canada for the calendar year 1921. Reports were received from 13 individual firms 11 of which were located in Ontario and one each in British Columbia and Manitoba. The statistics are presented in one total, in order to prevent the divulging of individual reports. As in nearly all other lines of industry, the year 1921 shows a marked decrease, when compared with 1920, which represents the peak year in Canadian industrial production.

## PRINCIPAL STATISTICS.

Table (1) presents the principal statistics of the industry for the Dominion as a whole for the calendar years 1920 and 1921. In capital investment in 1921 there was an increase of \$665,194, in the number of employees of 47 and in the amounts paidnfor salaries and wages of \$20,320, in the cost of fuel of \$63 and in miscellaneous expenses of 2,269. On the other hand decreases are shown in the cost of materials of \$303,525 and in the value of products of \$334,639.

#### FRODUCTION.

The statistics of production are presented in table (2) by quantities and selling values at the factory for the various items included in the schedule of products. The decrease of wines manufactured in 1921 amounted to 93,567 gallons.

#### CAPITAL.

Table (3) presents statistics of capital investment by items for the Dominion as a whole. Separate statistics by provinces cannot be given, as it would reveal individual statistic The increase in capital over the preceding year amounted to \$665,194, each item contributing its quota.

# EMPLOYEES, Salaries and Wages.

The number of persons employed in the industry also shows an increase over 1920. Males increased by 38 and females by 9. The amounts paid for salaries and wages increased by \$20,320. Salaried officers which numbered 28 in 1920, rose to 61 in 1921 and wage earners from 90 to 1920 to 104 in 1921.

#### UT SSIFIED WEEKLY WAGES

A table showing the employees classified according to the amount of weekly wages paid then is shown in table 5. The number receiving less than \$20 per week was 33, whilst those receiving over \$20 per week numbered 49.

#### MATERIALS

Table 6 summarizes the various classes of materials used in the industry by quantity and cost value delivered at the works. Grapes form the chief materials representing 35. 75 per cent of the total cost of all materials. Sugar is next with 23.63 per cent, followed by grape juice purchased with 13.37 per cent, whilst all other materials including containers represented 28.25 per cent.

#### FUEL STATISTICS

The consumption of fuel is shown by classes, quantity and value in table (7). The principal fuel used was coal, the total value of which amounted to \$9,025, or over 90 per cent of the entire cost for all fuel. Fuel of foreign origin cost \$9,292, whilst fuel of Canadian origin cost \$913.

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The classes of power employed in the industry are shown in table (8) by the number of units of each class, the horse-power capacity according to manufacturers' rating and the horse-power actually employed. Electric power with 31 units of 197 rated horse-power, of which II5 horse-power was actually employed, is the principal power used in the industry
