
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THE WINE INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1931.

The Wine Industry in Canada is confined to a few localities such as the Niagara Peninsula in Ontario and the Okanagan Valley in British Columbia where climatic conditions for the cultivation of grapes are favourable. In 1931 there were sixty-one establishments engaged in the production of wines, located by provinces as follows: - Ontario fifty two, British Columbia seven, Quebec one and Manitoba one. These plants reported a capital investment of \$8,685,821, an average employment of 455 persons who received \$526,683 in salaries and wages and a net value of production amounting to \$3,276,847. Wines produced during the year and placed in storage for maturing totalled 3,205,334 gallons with an inventory value of \$1,381,372, while the fermented wines bottled or sold in bulk during the year totalled 3,499,881 gallons valued at \$3,457,625. Fruit juices, medicated wines and other products produced were valued at \$11,109. In order to avoid duplication, however, the prime cost of wines produced in previous years and which were bottled or shipped in bulk during 1931 must be deducted from the gross value of production in order to arrive at the value of new products made by the industry in 1931. For detailed production statistics by provinces, see table 2.

The Wine Industry performs two distinct operations, viz., (1) production of wines which are placed in storage for maturing and which are therefore not sold during the current year and (2) bottling or shipping in bulk of matured wines which have been produced in previous years. Several changes have, therefore, been made in the schedule for 1931 in order to show each of these operations more clearly as well as to show the value of new products made by the industry each year. Due to these changes, it is impossible to compare the production statistics for 1931 with those of 1930. However, compared with the previous year, the industry reported an increase of seventeen establishments with an increase of \$127,855 in the capital invested as well as an increase of forty—two employees with a decrease of \$34,546 in the salaries and wages paid. It is interesting to note that the province of Ontario produced 91 per cent of the total value and 93 per cent of the total quantity of wine produced in 1931.

The output of wines in Canada is not sufficient to meet the domestic demand. Large quantities of wine are, therefore, imported annually into Canada. In 1931, the imports of sparkling and non-sparkling wines were valued at \$1,879,367 as compared with a net domestic production valued at \$3,276,847. Exports of wines are small, being valued at \$115,083 in 1930 and only \$966 in 1931.

Detailed statistics of production, employment, capital invested, imports and exports, etc., are given in the tables following.

Principal Statistics.

A comparative summary of the principal statistics of the industry for the years 1926 to 1931 is shown in table 1.
