THE WINE INDUSTRY

1951

The wine Industry in Canada is confined to a few localities such as the Niagara Peninsula in Ontario and the Okanagan Valley and other fruit growing districts in British Columbia where climatic conditions for the cultivation of grapes and berries suitable for wine are favourable. In this industry in 1951 there were 26 establishments, located by provinces as follows: New Brunswick 1, Quebec 1, Ontario 19 and British Columbia 5. These plants had an employment of 556 persons, who received \$1,677,916 in salaries and wages, and had a net value of production amounting to \$10,098,170. Wines produced during the year and placed in storage for maturing totalled 4,677,055 gallons with an inventory value of \$3,136,996, while the fermented wines bottled or sold in bulk during the year totalled 4,386 918 gallons valued at \$11,147,846. Other products were valued at \$328,268. In order to avoid duplication, however, the prime cost of wines produced in previous years and which were bottled or

shipped in bulk during the current year must be deducted from the gross value of production in order to arrive at the value of new products made. For detailed production statistics see Table 2.

The wine industry consists of two distinct operations viz. (1) production of wines which are placed in storage for maturing and which are, therefore, not sold during the current year and (2) bottling or shipping in bulk of matured wines which have been produced in previous years. Production of wine in 1951 amounting to 4,677,055 gallons shows a decrease of 1,207,789 gallons and the sales amounting to 4,386,918 gallons decreased by 71,919 gallons. It may be noted that the province of Ontario accounted for 88.1 per cent of the total net value of production.
