REPORT ON THE PRODUCTION OF PROCESSED CHEESE, CANADA, 1937.

The foundation of "Processed" cheese is Cheddar cheese, and the process of manufacture is stated to consist of grinding the cheese, heating it in a jacketed container with agitation and then filling it into the proper receptacles. The cheese is pasteurized by the heat applied, and the effect is to check fermentation. A secret of the process is to apply this degree of heat and at the same time prevent the fat from "oiling off". The cheese is marketed in packages of one half and one quarter pound and in bulk. The product varies in firmness, ranging from the soft cream cheese to the fairly solid cheese which can be sliced.

The number of plants reporting production in 1937 was 19, distributed by provinces as follows: Ontario, 11; Quebec, 6; Manitoba, 1 and Alberta, 1. The following table gives production and export of processed cheese in the years 1925 to 1937, and appended is a list of the manufacturers.

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ADVANCE REPORT ON THE PRODUCTION OF DAIRY FACTORIES, CAMADA, 1936. (Issued October 19, 1937.)

The following changes in the advance report are made necessary owing to a correction in the Quebec figures for the production of creamery butter.

Page 1:-

In place of paragraph two, page one, "Creamery Butter", read: The production of creamery butter in Canada in 1936 amounted to 250,924,813 pounds. This quantity is the largest ever produced in Canada in any one year and exceeds the previous high record year (1935) by 10,006,014 pounds, or 4 per cent. The total value of the butter was \$57,662,687, an increase over the preceding year of \$5,434,554, or 10 per cent. The average price per pound was 22.98 cents, an average higher than for some years past, but still much below prices in the years 1915 to 1930. All provinces show increases in quantity of product over the preceding year, excepting British Columbia, which records a decrease. Ontario and Quebec are the chief centres of the dairying industry, the production of creamery butter in the former province representing 34 per cent of the total output for the Dominion, and the production of the latter, 30 per cent. The position occupied by each of the other provinces with respect to total output is as follows: Alberta and Saskatchewan, each 10 per cent; Manitoba, 9 per cent; British Columbia, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, each 2 per cent; and Prince Edward Island, 1 per cent. Average prices during the year were highest in Nova Scotia and lowest in Saskatchewan.

In place of paragraph six, page one, "Total Value of Output", read: The total value of production of the dairy factory industry in 1936 was \$121,292,306, an increase over the preceding year of \$13,261,151, or 12 per cent.

Page 2:-

For the quantity, value, and average price per pound of creamery butter in quebec province in 1936, read: 74,487,024 lb.; \$17,176,664; 23.06¢ in place of...... 78,605,833 "; \$19,049,419; 24.23¢.
