

THE CONFECTIONERY INDUSTRY

1951

In 1951 the output of the confectionery, cocoa and chocolate industries declined. The gross value of products decreased from \$104,853,748 to \$90,220,866 or 13.9 per cent. The cost of materials used, decreased from \$54,520,295 to \$48,795,224 or 10.5 per cent. Employment showed a drop of 2,033 employees, or 18.7 per cent; while salaries and wages decreased from \$18,451,058 to \$16,867,348, or a drop of 8.6 per cent.

It should be noted that statistics for Newfoundland were included with the 1950 tables for the first time. As there is only one establishment reporting, the figures have been included with those of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, in order to prevent disclosure of individual figures. The number of establishments reporting in 1951 was 195, and were located by provinces as follows: Newfoundland, 1; Nova Scotia, 8; New Brunswick, 4; Quebec, 51;

Ontario, 78; Manitoba, 12; Saskatchewan, 1; Alberta, 7; and British Columbia, 33.

Of added interest to the statistics on the Confectionery Industry is the inclusion of a table showing the estimated capital, repair and maintenance expenditures covering the years 1947-1952. (See Table 11 for detailed figures).

To bring the industry in line with the Standard Classification currently used in the Bureau, the confectionery, cocoa, chocolate and chewing gum industries were separated from the biscuit and ice cream cone industry. However, in order to maintain the historical trend of the combined industries a table is included showing the principal statistics for the biscuit, ice cream, confectionery and chewing gum industries as a unit. Now they are requested to report only the warehouse and sales staff working in the plant.
