THE CONFECTIONERY INDUSTRY

1957

Beginning in 1952, the Bureau changed its policy with regard to the collection of statistics on the production of manufactured goods. Firms in several industries, where year-end inventory changes were known to be insignificant, were requested to report value of shipments f.o.b. plant instead of gross value of production. This change-over should result in better consumption data and should, eventually, provide industry with better statistics for economic analysis.

The following facts should be considered when the detail of the historical series on this Industry is considered. In 1932, firms manufacturing ice-cream only were transferred from this Industry to that of Miscellaneous Dairy Products. In 1946, firms were instructed to omit all sales staff and warehouse employees who were not directly employed in the manufacturing plant. Some firms had previously reported all their sales and warehousing employees located throughout all of Canada. Beginning in 1949 firms in Newfoundland are included.

In 1955 manufacturers whose main products are roasted peanuts or ready-to-eat popcorn were added to the Confectionery Industry in accordance with Standard Industrial Classification recommendations.

Formerly these firms had been compiled with the Miscellaneous Food Preparations Industry. Principal Statistics in Tables 1 and 2 have been revised back to 1936 by the addition of the firms which were operating in those years.

Of the 213 establishments reporting in 1957 92 are located in Ontario and account for more than half of the value of shipments. Quebec ranks second with 59 establishments producing over 31% of the total.

In tables 2 and 3, a column on "Value Added by Manufacture" is included. The method of arriving at these figures is as follows: (see table 5) up to and including 1951—value of production minus cost of materials, fuel and electricity; 1952 and 1953—value of shipments minus cost of materials, fuel and electricity; 1954 and subsequent years—value of production minus cost of materials, fuel and electricity. The value of production was computed thus: 1954 and 1955—value of shipments minus opening inventory of finished goods plus closing inventory of finished goods; 1956 and subsequent years—value of shipments minus opening inventory of finished goods and goods-in-process plus closing inventory of finished goods and goods-in-process.
