

GENERAL REVIEW OF TEXTILES EXCEPT CLOTHING

1953

A total of \$700,690,265 worth of goods was shipped from the factories of the textiles except clothing group of manufacturing industries in 1953. The inventories held by the group in plant and plant warehouses were valued at \$71,858,000 at the end of 1953 compared with \$58,484,000 at the end of 1952. Allowing for this \$13,174,000 increase in inventory results in an estimated gross value of production of \$714,064,265, a figure 4 per cent below the preceding year's \$744,141,645. Employment, on the other hand, was slightly ahead. The monthly payrolls listed an average 73,190 persons in 1953 compared with 72,739 in 1952 and total salary and wage payments for the later year amounted to \$184,604,616 compared with \$178,689,466 in the earlier. The fall in the gross value of production was accompanied by a 7 per cent drop in the cost of materials used from \$418,522,518 to \$388,324,584.

The textile industry operated at a considerably higher level during the first half of 1953 than during the last half. It had begun to emerge from its post-Korean slump in August 1952 and the recovery extended well into the year under review. In June, however, excessive inventories at all levels and lower clothing production resulted in a decline which persisted for the balance of the year. By December activity was 16 per cent below December, 1952. For the year as a whole the level of activity as measured by man-hours employed was almost 5 per cent higher than in 1952. The physical volume index for the group based on 1935-1939=100 moved up from 184.1 in 1952 to 187.6 in 1953, a gain of about 2 per cent.

For 1953, then, the physical volume of production was higher than in 1952 while the gross value of production was lower. The reason for this situation is to be found in the generally lower price structure for fibres, textiles and textile products in the later year as compared with the former. According to an index maintained by the Bureau, the wholesale price level of this group of commodities was 5 per cent lower in 1953 than in 1952. The prices of cotton yarn and cotton fabric were down 13 per cent and 6 per cent, respectively. A factor behind these reductions was the 14 per cent fall in the price of raw cotton over the period. The price of rayon yarn was about the same for the two years but rayon fabric was 11 per cent lower. Worsted yarn and wool cloth, on the other hand, were up in price, the increase stemming from higher raw wool prices. The increase in the case of worsted yarn was 11 per cent and 3 per cent in the case of wool cloth. Further price data is to be found in Table 11.

The textiles except clothing group was comprised of 959 establishments in 1953, 41 more than in the previous year. These were distributed provincially as follows: Newfoundland 5, Prince Edward Island 3, Nova Scotia 11, New Brunswick 16, Quebec 449, Ontario 383, Manitoba 34, Saskatchewan 8, Alberta 15 and British Columbia 35. As indicated

by the number of establishments, Quebec and Ontario dominate the activity of the group. Quebec accounted for \$368,041,696 or 53 per cent and Ontario for \$293,741,315 or 42 per cent of the \$700,690,265 worth of products shipped by the group in 1953. The former reported 41,009 and the latter 27,959 employees, 56 per cent and 38 per cent, respectively, of its total employment.

Table 4 gives principal statistics by economic areas, by industry. In 1953, cotton yarn and cloth was the leading textile industry in the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec and Ontario with factory shipments valued at \$8,118,604, \$138,284,551 and \$63,796,856, respectively, in the three areas. In Quebec, the second most important industry was synthetic textiles and silk with factory shipments valued at \$83,894,376, followed by woollen cloth, \$25,167,160, miscellaneous textiles, n.e.s., \$24,714,059, and oilcloth, linoleum and other coated fabrics, \$22,311,377. Synthetic textiles and silk also held the second position in Ontario with factory shipments worth \$57,869,978, followed by woollen cloth, \$30,844,880, woollen yarn, \$26,363,134, and miscellaneous woollen goods, \$21,512,038.

The main textile industry in the Prairie Provinces in 1953 was cotton and jute bags which reported the shipment of \$9,523,192 worth of products. The woollen cloth industry was in second place in this area with shipments valued at \$2,557,162. In British Columbia it was the leading industry with shipments totalling \$1,812,732.

A report on textiles except clothing would be incomplete without a review of the various component industries comprising the group. All have been dealt with fully in separate reports and the following is intended as a resume only of the more important aspects of their activity in 1953.

The cotton textile industry entered 1953 with brighter prospects than it had at the beginning of 1952. The expanded activity in the latter part of 1952 had given rise to considerable optimism for the coming year. The upsurge, however, continued for only the first four months of 1953 after which activity decreased steadily until the end of the year. In terms of both employment and raw cotton consumption, activity for 1953 as a whole was somewhat ahead of the previous year. Because of the lower cotton textile price structure obtaining in the later year as compared with the former, however, the gross value of production was lower. The output of the industry was valued at \$238,470,474 in 1953, a figure slightly below the preceding year's \$246,397,090. Production was, therefore, \$7,282,000 in excess of factory shipments which totalled \$231,188,174. Employees numbered 24,808 in 1953 compared with 24,472 in 1952 and their earnings amounted to \$59,296,536 in the later year compared with \$57,579,651 in the earlier. A slightly higher yardage of broadwoven cotton fabrics, the industry's main product, was produced in 1953 as compared with 1952.

The factory shipments made by the wool textile industries in the year under review had a value f.o.b. plant of \$142,868,776. The inventories held by the group in plants and plant warehouses were valued at \$12,879,000 at the end of 1953 compared with \$10,354,000 at the end of 1952. Taking into consideration this \$2,525,000 increase in inventory results in an estimated gross value of production of \$145,393,776, which amount represents a decline of 3.7 per cent from the preceding year's \$150,935,470. Employment fell from 15,276 in 1952 to 15,206 in 1953 and the cost of materials consumed in manufacture from \$85,285,954 to \$83,322,444. The wool cloth industry alone was responsible for the lower level of the activity of the group in 1953. The other three members of the wool group managed increases in both production and employment but their gains, combined, were not large enough to offset the reduced employment and output reported by the wool cloth industry. Woven suiting, dress goods, overcoatings and cloakings, which together represent the wool industry's most important line of production, were chiefly responsible for the diminished sales volume.

The level of operations reported by the synthetic textile and silk industry in 1953 was slightly below the previous year's level. The value of the industry's shipments totalled \$146,418,307. Taking into account the finished goods inventory change for the year which was an increase of \$6,348,000, it would appear that actual production was somewhat less than the \$157,628,515 gross value of production reported in 1952. The index of the volume of production fell from 344.4 in 1952 to 340.5 in 1953, a drop of 1.1 per cent. Employees numbered 15,723, exactly the same as the year before. The cost of materials used was very little different in the two years, being \$63,938,444 in 1953 and \$63,780,047 in 1952. The industry shipped 96,397,093 yards of woven fabrics worth \$72,222,993 in the year under review compared with the earlier year's output of 103,941,827 yards with a value of \$83,908,135.

The 52 establishments in the narrow fabrics industry reported factory shipments with a value f.o.b. plant of \$17,453,760, an increase of \$738,000 or 4.4 per cent over the \$16,715,760 worth of products shipped in 1952. Employment was provided for 2,163 persons, 128 or 6.3 per cent more than in the former year. The most important single product was webbing which was shipped to the value of \$4,667,749. Other leading commodities were ribbons with shipments valued at \$2,680,301 and tapes with shipments worth \$1,814,975.

Activity in the dyeing and finishing of textile goods industry is closely related to the level of operations in the primary textile industries, rising and falling with it. Despite the fall in activity in the yarn and cloth mills during 1952, however, the industry had succeeded not only in holding its own but had managed a slight increase in the value of work performed. The inevitable adjustment to the reduced level of operations in associated trades came in the year under review. The value of work

performed amounted to \$13,104,552 compared with \$14,606,604 in 1952, a drop of 10 per cent, and employment fell from 2,331 to 2,255 over the two years.

The awning, tent and sail industry in 1953 reported shipments totalling \$12,392,074, an increase of 9.8 per cent over the preceding year's figure of \$11,281,927. Employment was up from 1,521 in 1952 to 1,579 in the year under review. The most important products were tarpaulins, awnings, tents and bags, in that order. Compared with the previous year, shipments of all but the last item, bags, were ahead. Value of shipments of the four commodities in 1953 was \$2,550,511, \$1,975,999, \$1,160,889 and \$789,579, respectively.

In 1953, for the third year in a row, the cordage, rope and twine industry reported a decline in the value of factory shipments. Binder twine, baler twine, other twine and rope shipments were all lower in terms of both volume and value. Shipments totalled \$15,045,023 in the year under review, down 16 per cent from the previous year's \$17,866,014. Binder twine accounted for over half of the \$2,820,991 fall.

In terms of value of output the cotton and jute bag industry operated at a considerably lower level in 1953 than in 1952. Factory shipments were valued at \$25,321,927 in the later year compared with \$30,196,073 in the earlier. In terms of volume of production, however, there was practically no change. This situation reflected the production of a slightly larger number of jute bags at a substantially reduced average price. Shipments of jute bags in 1953 amounted to 5,658,484 dozen compared with 5,547,172 dozen in 1952. Cotton bag shipments also increased, the figures for 1952 and 1953 being 3,479,074 dozen and 3,770,946 dozen, respectively.

Goods having a value f.o.b. plant of \$30,833,083 were shipped from the factories of the oilcloth, linoleum and coated fabrics industry in 1953. This compares with the 1952 figure of \$30,545,392 and represents a slight increase. The volume of linoleum floor coverings and table oilcloth was higher than in the previous year while that for felt based floor coverings was lower.

In addition there are three industries which together comprise the miscellaneous textile goods industry of the Standard Industrial Classification adopted in 1949. They are embroidery, pleating, hemstitching, etc., fabric auto accessories and miscellaneous textiles, n.e.s. All of these reported growth in the year under review with the number of establishments, employment, material consumption and factory shipments for each higher than the year before.

A principal feature of this report is a detailed list of textile products (except clothing) shipped by Canadian manufacturers in 1952 and 1953. Table 17 shows total factory shipments and hence includes all commodities reported by all firms no matter what their industrial classification.

Consumption of Apparel Fibres in Canada

Several years ago the Nylon Division of Canadian Industries commenced a study of trends in the consumption of apparel fibres in Canada. The Bureau was asked to co-operate in this survey and did so willingly for it had long recognized the need for research of this nature and had intended undertaking just such a study when time and staff permitted. A table showing the total apparent consumption of apparel-type fibres in Canada from 1926-1950 was the first important product of the study. Data for the years 1951 and 1952 have since been prepared by the company and added to the Table. Because of its usefulness as background material for textile research, it is presented here with the kind permission of Canadian Industries Limited.

The figures shown in the table represent the volume of fibres as they enter final consumption in all textile uses. Consumption by products measured subsequent to the spinning process is calculated on an actual weight basis while consumption by products measured prior to the spinning process is calculated on a spinnable fibre content basis. The "spinnable fibre" concept denotes the volume of fibre which is actually consumed in textile uses and excludes that volume which is removed as waste or relegated to non-textile applications. Total Apparent Consumption is defined as domestic production, plus imports, less exports.
